Tuesday of each month. The communal Rosary is also livestreamed for any participants who wish to join us remotely.





Saint of the Week: Saint Mark Feast Day: April 25th



Most of what we know about Mark comes directly from the New Testament. He is usually identified with the Mark of Acts 12:12. When Saint Peter escaped from prison, he went to the home of Mark's mother.

Paul and Barnabas took him along on the first missionary journey, but for some reason Mark returned alone to Jerusalem. It is evident, from Paul's refusal to let Mark accompany him on the second journey despite Barnabas's insistence, that Mark had displeased Paul. Because Paul later asks Mark to visit him in prison, we may assume the trouble did not last long.

The oldest and the shortest of the four Gospels, the Gospel of Mark emphasizes Jesus's rejection by humanity while being God's triumphant envoy. Probably written for gentile converts in Rome—after the death of Peter and Paul sometime between A.D. 60 and 70—Mark's Gospel is the gradual manifestation of a "scandal": a crucified Messiah.

Evidently a friend of Mark—calling him "my son"—Peter is only one of this Gospel's sources, others being the Church in Jerusalem (Jewish roots), and the Church at Antioch (largely Gentile). Like another Gospel writer Luke, Mark was not one of the 12 apostles. We cannot be certain whether he knew Jesus personally. Some scholars feel that the evangelist is speaking of himself when describing the arrest of Jesus in Gethsemane: "Now a young man followed him wearing nothing but a linen cloth about his body. They seized him, but he left the cloth behind and ran off naked" (Mark 14:51-52).

Others hold Mark to be the first bishop of Alexandria, Egypt. Venice, famous for the Piazza San Marco, claims Mark as its patron saint; the large basilica there is believed to contain his remains.

A winged lion is Mark's symbol. The lion derives from Mark's description of John the Baptist as a "voice of one crying out in the desert" (Mark 1:3), which artists compared to a roaring lion. The wings come from the application of Ezekiel's vision of four winged creatures to the evangelists.

Mark fulfilled in his life what every Christian is called to do: proclaim to all people the Good News that is the source of salvation. In particular, Mark's way was by writing. Others may proclaim the Good News by music, drama, poetry, or by teaching children around a family table. How do you fulfill that challenge?

About World Day of Prayer of Vocations April 21, 2024

On this 61st anniversary of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations, also liturgically known as Good Shepherd Sunday, we are invited to pray for and promote all vocations. Initiated by Saint Paul VI during the Second Vatican Council in 1964, the purpose of this day is to help all of us respond to God's call and to support in prayer all those who are discerning how to best respond to the needs of today in the vocation God calls them to be.

As Catholics, we firmly believe that God has a plan for our lives! He calls some to marriage, some to the priesthood, and others to religious life or to live as generous single people. Fully living our own vocations—and teaching young people how to discern God's call—is a serious duty, but also a joyful one. During this week, please encourage the young people in your life—children, grandchildren, students, and friends—to be open if God calls them to priesthood or religious life.

Here's something to think about: We belong to the Diocese of Fall River which consists of 69 parishes spread across southeastern Massachusetts, Cape Cod and the Islands of Martha's Vinyard and Nantucket. These parishes are grouped in five deaneries. We belong to the Attleboro deanery which covers the seven parishes found in Attleboro, North Attleborough, Mansfield, Norton, and Seekonk.


There are a total of 133 diocesan priests in our diocese. Diocesan priests are ordained for service within a particular diocese and in most cases, spend their entire priesthood serving in that diocese. We also have approximately 69 religious order priests (like Fr. Ken and Fr. Gabriel) serving in our diocese. Of the 133 diocesan priests, 77 are retired, sick, or on leave of absence, 4 are serving outside of the diocese, and 56 are serving within our diocese. Of these 56, Fr. Costa, (who will turn 65 this November) is 5th in seniority (by number of years ordained – 39 years this June). 60 of the 69 parishes are staffed by diocesan priests. The other nine parishes are staffed by Sacred Hearts, LaSalette, Holy Cross, Incarnate Word, and Vocationist Fathers and Brothers.

In addition to the priests, our diocese is served by 91 permanent deacons (Deacon Joe being one) and there are 92 consecrated religious women (Sister Kathee being one) from 12 different communities/congregations serving and living within the diocese. The majority of our women religious are retired, living and volunteering in a number of ways throughout the Diocese.

This year, we have no retirements among our diocesan priests. There will be one priestly ordination (Brian Bangs, from Sandwich, MA) and one transitional deacon ordination (Lucas DaCosta from Fall River). After they are ordained, we will have two men studying for the priesthood; one is from the Azores, Portugal and the other from Brazil. Our parish is blessed to have one young man (Evan Mello) applying to the seminary for this September.

From this brief overview of statistics you can see we need priests, deacons, consecrated religious and dedicated lay ministers. Please add this important intention to your private prayer. Encourage our young men and women in their Faith. Pray for Evan as he begins his seminary formation and ask the Lord to inspire more women and men to answer the call to serve God's holy people.



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



FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Shepherd:

The image of the good shepherd has always been with the Church. Pictures of the Good Shepherd crowd our imagination. From childhood on, we can remember a thousand pictures of the same Good Shepherd. The sheep are content and snow white. A lamb rides aloft the kindly and gentle shepherd's shoulder. This image comforts, sustains, and calms. Year in and year out, the Church celebrates Jesus as the Good Shepherd on this Fourth Sunday of Easter. It's a rich image worth our careful meditation.

Comment:

Peter's first miracle got him in trouble. As leader of the early Church, he learned firsthand that his life would follow that of his master. A small introduction to today's first reading is in order: Peter's cure of the invalid who asked for money set the onlookers abuzz. Word spread rapidly, and Peter was unceremoniously thrown into jail, and the following day, he was brought before the elders and scribes. He was ordered to explain himself, his words, his actions, and the belief of those he led and served. This was his chance to justify himself and his fledgling community.

But Peter did not justify anything. He simply proclaimed his belief and suggested to the skeptical if not cynical listeners that they also accept this rejected one, Jesus Christ the Nazorean "whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead." Peter's words and eventually his actions witnessed his faith. Peter spoke fearlessly of Jesus who, like a good shepherd, laid down his life for his sheep. The Gospel reading for this "Good Shepherd Sunday" also follows upon a cure. Jesus cured the man born blind, and for this he was questioned severely by the Pharisees. Jesus' discourse on the good shepherd describes his relationship to the man born blind and to us—all of us, Pharisees included.

It is interesting to note that Jesus uses the image of a shepherd. In Israel's history, shepherds were held in high enough regard. After all, the great king, David, was a shepherd. But now in Israel, shepherds were outsiders. Their consuming occupation kept them outside, literally and figuratively. They were outside in all kinds of weather, and they were also outside the law, in that they were unable to obey its ever-demanding rigors. In the eyes of the harsh rule-makers, the shepherds were among those stones rejected by the builder, cast onto the rubble heap.

Reflection:

Jesus uses these outsider shepherds as a new image of redemption. Jesus is not talking about the shepherd as such or the sheep as such, but about the relationship between the shepherd and sheep. Clearly the phony shepherd will flee at the first sight of trouble. And one can safely wager that most shepherds would not be inclined to die for a sheep, but would write the animal off as a loss and one of the costs of doing business in a harsh terrain. But the good shepherd differs dramatically; he will go so far as to lay down his life for his sheep—an unheard-of claim. The current religious leaders of Israel clearly wouldn't do this; rather they seem to harangue their followers.

In Israel at Jesus' time, shepherds tended relatively small flocks and knew their sheep by name, knew their markings and temperaments. The good shepherd knows his own more intimately that this. He knows them the way the Father knows Jesus. The depth of intimacy between leader and follower is the same as the intimacy between Father and Son. And that intimacy can include everyone on earth. During this Eastertide, we reflect more deeply on the Resurrection. The leader has laid down his life for the led. He has done so freely for our sake. He has laid down his life willingly and taken up his risen life gladly.

Evangelist \i-'van-jə-list\

One who announces Good News, particularly the message of the gospel. Often refers exclusively to the four gospel writers Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John. The New Testament also uses this term in reference to Philip, the deacon, and Timothy, a worker with Paul.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What's an evangelist?

Evangelist translates from Greek as "messenger of good tidings." All baptized persons are called to be such messengers. Isaiah speaks of the "beautiful feet" of those who bring Good News. Ephesians describes apostles, prophets, and **evangelists** as central players in the church. Biblically, **evangelist** is not an exclusive term.

By the third century, the formal list of **evangelists** is reduced to the four gospel writers, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. They concretized the Good News the church would proclaim going forward.

By the fourth century, the symbology of the four **evangelists** became standardized as man, lion, ox, and eagle. Facing the four directions, these extraordinary creatures are four and yet unified in movement. They also burn like hot coals. Matthew, whose gospel emphasizes Jesus' humanity, is represented by the man. Mark highlights Jesus' divinity and kingship, so is identified as the lion. Luke holds up the sacrificial role of Jesus and so becomes the ox. John is the eagle as his gospel soars with a transcendent perspective on Jesus as the Christ.
