

### Saint of the Week: Saint Catherine of Siena

The value Catherine makes central in her short life and which sounds clearly and consistently through her experience is complete surrender to Christ. What is most impressive about her is that she learns to view her surrender to her Lord as a goal to be reached through time.

She was the 23rd child of Jacopo and Lapa Benincasa and grew up as an intelligent, cheerful, and intensely religious person. Catherine disappointed her mother by cutting off her hair as a protest against being overly encouraged to improve her appearance in order to attract a husband. Her father ordered her to be left in peace, and she was given a room of her own for prayer and meditation.

She entered the Dominican Third Order at 18 and spent the next three years in seclusion, prayer, and austerity. Gradually, a group of followers gathered around her—men and women, priests and religious. An active public apostolate grew out of her contemplative life. Her letters, mostly for spiritual instruction and encouragement of her followers, began to take more and more note of public affairs. Opposition and slander resulted from her mixing fearlessly with the world and speaking with the candor and authority of one completely committed to Christ. She was cleared of all charges at the Dominican General Chapter of 1374.

Her public influence reached great heights because of her evident holiness, her membership in the Dominican Third Order, and the deep impression she made on the pope. She worked tirelessly for the crusade against the Turks and for peace between Florence and the pope. In 1378, the Great Schism began, splitting the allegiance of Christendom between two, then three, popes and putting even saints on opposing sides. Catherine spent the last two years of her life in Rome, in prayer and pleading on behalf of the cause of Pope Urban VI and the unity of the Church. She offered herself as a victim for the Church in its agony. She died surrounded by her "children" and was canonized in 1461.

Catherine ranks high among the mystics and spiritual writers of the Church. In 1939, she and Francis of Assisi were declared co-patrons of Italy. Pope Paul VI named her and Teresa of Avila doctors of the Church in 1970. Her spiritual testament is found in The Dialogue.

Though she lived her life in a faith experience and spirituality far different from that of our own time, Catherine of Siena stands as a companion with us on the Christian journey in her undivided effort to invite the Lord to take flesh in her own life. Events which might make us wince or chuckle or even yawn fill her biographies: a mystical experience at six, childhood betrothal to Christ, stories of harsh asceticism, her frequent ecstatic visions. Still, Catherine lived in an age which did not know the rapid change of 21st-century mobile America. The value of her life for us today lies in her recognition of holiness as a goal to be sought over the course of a lifetime.





### FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

### Tending:

For as long as memory serves, agricultural peoples have tended vines and orchards. Spring was pruning season, when the strongest branches were strengthened, the weak and dead branches fed to the fire. When Jesus looked out over the vineyards at night, he saw the small fires burning the discarded branches. All day long the vines were trussed and tended. Before long, there would be good new wine.

### Comment:

The Gospel for this Sunday is drawn from Jesus' long Last Supper discourse. This is Passover time; the moon is full. The signs of spring tending are everywhere. The apostles know well that this is the time of trussing and splicing of branches. Jesus uses these strong reminders to speak of his relationship to the apostles. They must be tightly grafted to him, as branches are to the vine. He is the strong vine from which they all draw their life. Jesus does not speak here of the apostles' solidarity with one another, but focuses instead on the source of that solidarityhimself. He is the source of each life. They can flower from this single, vital source. He will be the source of their life and of all of their relationships. The first reading offers a glimpse of this flowering, which takes the form of a formidable challenge. Here we have the newly converted Saul, moving rather casually, it seems, among the disciples in Jerusalem who are understandably very frightened of him. They are not entirely sure of this one-time ferocious enemy. So, Barnabas takes on the challenge of introducing Saul to the apostles and explaining how he had spoken fearlessly "... in the name of Jesus." Barnabas is successful, and in the end, it is not the new Christians who locked horns with Saul, but rather the Greek-speaking Jews. As a result of their wrath, the apostles think it best to spirit Saul away and send him home to Tarsus until things cool down.

### Reflection:

We are assured in this reading that, excepting this incident, the Church was fundamentally at peace and growing steadily. Surface tensions may occur, and this is to be expected. Life is messy, after all. 'Twas always thus and 'twill always be. The only real trouble arises when the Church fails to adhere to Jesus as the sole source of its life. The second reading can be seen as operating instructions to help the Church avoid this sad state. We are advised to live by faith in the name of Jesus Christ and by a love that shows in deed and truth. That kind of active, honest love is a good test of our adherence to Jesus, the vine. Like the early Church, we may be faced with injustice and a lack of tranquility inside and outside our ranks. We are called to pray for peace and justice and to act in love and deed to bring about that very peace and justice. If we do not, there is no truth in our words. We can ask ourselves quietly and our communities out loud how willing we are to act as people grafted tightly to Christ. How willing are we to accept irresponsible disengagement from the place where we live? How willing are we to choose virtual lives, "wired" to someone else's machinery? Jesus calls for our solidarity in him, which is the source of our solidarity with one another. This solidarity means engagement. Our prayers and deeds and openness cannot exist in some ethereal realm. They must be down-to-earth and carried out by down-to-earth people, like us. Human connections have fragrance and taste and texture and warmth. First, we are called to consider the source, the risen Lord. Then to consider the flowering—the Church, that is, the people. This is the continuing Easter time of new growth and flowering. This is spring time for the soul. We are to support one another in our efforts to be at peace and to act in fairness. We are asked to take on the tough love that shows in the deeds that match our words.

Doctor, from the Latin *docere*, meaning "to teach"; an eminent teacher of the faith, canonized and recognized as such by the pope or church council. Originally eight in number, four were chosen from the Eastern Church and four from the West. To date there are 37 **church doctors**, including four women.

## QUESTION OF THE WEEK

### Who are the doctors of the church?

Doctors of the church are always canonized saints, defined by three criteria: eminent learning, a high degree of sanctity, and proclamation by a pope or council. Their naming isn't an infallible decision and doesn't presume their writings are free from error. A doctor's primary significance is as Confessor of the faith. That is why martyrs, such as Ignatius and Cyprian, were originally excluded. Irenaeus of Lyon was added in 2022, however, so doctor-martyrs are now a possibility.

Currently, there are 37 doctors of the church, with 17 being from religious orders: Five Benedictines; three each of Carmelites, Dominicans, and Franciscans; two Jesuits; and one Redemptorist. Each doctor reveals an avenue of grace through unique achievements in such areas as apologetics, homiletics, history, education, science, art, music, poetry, catechesis, mysticism, morality, and spirituality.

### Follow the doctor's advice

Catherine of Siena transcended the narrow roles to which Medieval laypeople—and women in particular—were subject. She gave wise counsel to popes, negotiated settlements, kept a continuous correspondence with her followers throughout Italy, and composed *The Dialogue*, an account of her conversation with God, which is widely considered a masterpiece of spiritual literature and contributed to her being named a **doctor of the church**. Amazingly she accomplished all this despite being almost completely illiterate! How? She dictated everything.
