






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Welcome Bishop da Cunha!

Saint of the Week: Saint Julie Billiart

Born in Cuvilly, France, into a family of well-to-do farmers, young Marie Rose Julie Billiart showed an early interest in religion and in helping the sick and poor. Though the first years of her life were relatively peaceful and uncomplicated, Julie had to take up manual work as a young teen when her family lost its money. However, she spent her spare time teaching catechism to young people and to the farm laborers.

A mysterious illness overtook her when she was about 30. Witnessing an attempt to wound or even kill her father, Julie was paralyzed and became a complete invalid. For the next two decades, she continued to teach catechism lessons from her bed, offered spiritual advice, and attracted visitors who had heard of her holiness.

When the French Revolution broke out in 1789, revolutionary forces became aware of her allegiance to fugitive priests. With the help of friends, she was smuggled out of Cuvilly in a haycart. She then spent several years hiding in Compiegne, being moved from house to house despite her growing physical pain. She even lost the power of speech for a time.

But this period also proved to be a fruitful spiritual time for Julie. It was at this time she had a vision in which she saw Calvary surrounded by women in religious habits and heard a voice saying, "Behold these spiritual daughters whom I give you in an institute marked by the cross."

As time passed and Julie continued her mobile life, she made the acquaintance of an aristocratic woman, Françoise Blin de Bourdon, who shared Julie's interest in teaching the faith. In 1803, the two women began the Institute of Notre Dame, which was dedicated to the education of the poor, young Christian girls, and the training of catechists. The following year the first Sisters of Notre Dame made their vows. That was the same year that Julie recovered from the illness: She was able to walk for the first time in 22 years.

Though Julie had always been attentive to the special needs of the poor and that always remained her priority, she also became aware that other classes in society needed Christian instruction. From the founding of the Sisters of Notre Dame until her death, Julie was on the road, opening a variety of schools in France and Belgium that served the poor and the wealthy, vocational groups, teachers. Ultimately, Julie and Françoise moved the motherhouse to Namur, Belgium. Julie died there in 1816 and was canonized in 1969.



The Feast Day of Saint Julie Billiart: April 8th



Julie Billiart would often say: "Ah! How good is the good God!" She founded the Sisters of Notre Dame de Namur to make known God's goodness, especially among the most impoverished and abandoned people in the world. Today, Sisters of Notre Dame work with refugees in London, street children in Nairobi, immigrant farm workers in Florida, AIDS orphans in Zimbabwe, the homeless in Haiti... and always, with women and children, who are among the most vulnerable.

When daffodils and crocuses crowd the garden walk, when the sun breaks over a clear spring morn, when all around is blossoming or in bloom, it's almost too easy to believe in the goodness of life, in the resurrection of the world. But when a child dies at the hands of an abuser, a family suffers the loss of a farm it has long tended, or a whole people become victims of human greed and cruelty, we wonder. How can this happen? How can God allow this to happen? How can we believe in resurrection with all these "deaths" around us? Resurrection faith demands such belief. Resurrection faith calls our attention to the fact that life comes out of death. There, in the passage from death to life, we encounter the risen Lord. The sign of Easter and its abiding joy is not the lily, not the newborn babe, but the empty tomb. A sign of meaninglessness, death, and contradiction, yes. But clearly, the most powerful sign of life.

Comment:

In today's first reading, Luke paints an all-but-idyllic picture of the earliest Christian community. The passage is one of Luke's famous "summaries" and describes the Spirit-inspired unitythe "one heart and mind"—of the first followers of Christ. Luke wants us to understand that unity is an effect, a sign of resurrection, here and now. Where there is union, there is life. In the second reading, John instructs us that we are children of God, united in faith, part of one, unified family in Christ risen from death. John goes to some pains in order to specify what our faith in Christ entails, namely, accepting and living God's commandments. Such acceptance and living will give us the ability to overcome the corrupt powers of the world. Our belief grants us a share in the victory Christ has already achieved by virtue of his death and resurrection. John insists that our faith is powerful because we have received the Spirit, who will never deceive us or fail us, for "the Spirit is truth." Today's Gospel is an account of one of Jesus' post-resurrection appearances to the apostles and includes the story of "doubting Thomas." It is important to understand that this last chapter of the Gospel according to John is regarded by many scholars as the last of the evangelist's writings. In it, John is telling the Christian community that Jesus is present to them, although not present in the flesh. John is urging the post-resurrection community (and that includes us) to acquire a broader faith. The Gospel ends with John telling us that he has carefully chosen the "signs" he has recorded in order to help the young Church flourish. John also reminds us to watch carefully for the signs of resurrection in our own lives. In them, Jesus Christ is present.

Reflection:

Any artist who has ever painted a picture or created a sculpture of the risen Lord owes a debt to "doubting Thomas." Thomas wanted an absolutely clear image of the risen Lord; he wanted to see and touch the wounds of Christ. Ever since, artists have been in sync with Thomas' visual and tactile demands and have provided us with such images. The image of the "wounded" Lord is not simply a matter of artistic representation or taste. It is, rather, a matter of faith. Lacking those wounds, the risen Lord is not the crucified Lord. Thomas has helped artists and all the rest of us recognize that before a resurrection, there comes a death. Thomas has helped us feel in our bones that our God is a God who takes human suffering seriously and out of it—even out of its seeming meaninglessness—can bring wondrous significance and new life. The risen Lord whom Thomas demanded to behold and examine is the only Lord worth believing in. That Lord wears the wounds of death yet promises the healing of life. That Lord assures us that our faith in him is not misplaced, that hope in him will be fulfilled, and that loving him even in suffering is what resurrected life is all about.

WHY IT MATTERS

Unlike many saving acts that are unilaterally achieved by the divine will, in the **Annunciation** a woman is invited to participate in the saving event that has consequences for all people and all time. Mary's yes is universal and limitless. At the **Annunciation**, Mary perfectly consents to God's will, then bears the Son, and is filled with the Spirit, which, as theologian Hans Urs von Balthasar notes, is wholly trinitarian.

From Pope Paul VI's *Marialis Cultus* ("Devotion to Mary"): [The **Annunciation** observance] was and is a joint one of Christ and of the Blessed Virgin: of the Word, who becomes Son of Mary, and of the Virgin, who becomes Mother of God.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What do I need to know about Mary?

There is the biblical Mary of Nazareth, who fulfills Isaiah's Emmanuel prophecy by giving birth to a child who is "God with us." Her Magnificat canticle foreshadows Jesus' proclamation that the mighty will be brought down while the poor are lifted up. Mary plays other noteworthy roles: advocating for a miracle at Cana, being present at the cross, and participating in the Spirit's reception at Pentecost. Finally, as Mary is the first disciple of her son, she is the ideal model for all of us.

The church teaches four doctrines about Mary. Two declarations declare her a virgin as well as the Mother of God. Two later doctrines teach that Mary was conceived immaculately (sinless) and that, at the point of death, was assumed body and soul to heaven.

Devotionally, Mary plays a large role in popular piety. Her icon has been venerated since the early centuries in the East. By means of the Rosary, litanies, and pilgrimage, people of many lands feel a special closeness to the mother of Jesus who is mother to all.
