

From Fr. Costa:

You may have heard Adam, our music director, refer to the Christmas Mass schedule in his "plug" for new choir members. Yes, that schedule has been determined. To assist with your planning, I offer the schedule and some of the rationale behind this time schedule.



As Christmas falls on a Monday this year, we celebrate a very, very brief fourth week of preparation. The **Fourth Sunday of Advent** is Saturday, December 23, and Sunday, December 24. There will be **two** Masses scheduled for this last Sunday of Advent:

Saturday, December 23, Vigil Mass @ 4:00 p.m. St. Mary Church

Sunday, December 24, Morning Mass @ 9:30 a.m. St. Mary Church



There will be six (6) Masses celebrated for the **Christmas** holy day in our parish. Each of our churches will have two Masses. As the 4:00 p.m. Vigil Mass is the most popular with our parishioners, there will be three 4:00 p.m. celebrations. The solemn Mass for Christmas will be celebrated at 9:00 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church. The Roman Missal (the official prayerbook for Mass) no longer refers to this as Midnight Mass. Now it is called "Mass in the Night." This Mass will feature our choir and instrumentalists. There will be a concert of Christmas music before the Mass. The full schedule for Christmas Masses is as follows:

Sacred Heart Church

Christmas Eve, December 24, Mass @ 4:00 p.m. Christmas Day, December 25 @ 8:00 a.m.

Sunday Mass

Should there be significant snowfall or extreme ice conditions on a weekend, especially if we have been warned or "encouraged" to stay off the roads, weekend Masses will be celebrated **ONLY** at Saint Mark Church. We will follow the usual Mass times, but all Masses will be moved to Stanley Street because (1) I live on that property and the Dominicans would not be driving from Providence to be with us, and (2) only one property will need to be plowed and shoveled in time for Mass. Please note: when we are told to stay off the roads because it is too dangerous to travel due to weather conditions, any Mass obligation does not hold. **STAY HOME** for your safety and the safety of others. The Lord certainly understands!

Daily Mass

When school is canceled or delayed due to winter weather, the daily Mass is also canceled. If the delay is on a Tuesday, we will have Mass on Tuesday afternoon. If there is an early dismissal of school due to winter weather on a Tuesday, the daily Mass on Tuesday afternoon is canceled.

Transfiguration of the Lord Respect Life Group Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe:

Please join us on Tuesday, Dec 12, 2023 at the 4:30 pm Mass at St. Mark church to celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This feast commemorates the four apparitions of Mary in 1531 to peasant Juan Diego near Mexico City. Mary told him that a church should be built in that spot. The bishop needed more proof however, and Mary sent Juan to pick roses (rare in December) to present to the bishop. When he opened his cloak (tilma) to show the roses to the bishop, they discovered a painted image of the Blessed Virgin imprinted on the tilma, which is now preserved in the Basilica of Mexico City. Among other titles related to this event, Mary was declared Patroness of the Americas in 1999. We hope you can join us for this tribute to our Blessed Mother. Comfort, give comfort to my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and proclaim to her that her service is at an end, her guilt is explated; indeed, she has received from the hand of the LORD double for all her sins.

A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

Go up on to a high mountain, Zion, herald of glad tidings; cry out at the top of your voice, Jerusalem, herald of good news! Fear not to cry out and say to the cities of Judah: Here is your God! Here comes with power the Lord GOD, who rules by his strong arm; here is his reward with him, his recompense before him. 


Responsorial Psalm for Advent

Second Reading

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Peter

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years and a thousand years like one day. The Lord does not delay his promise, as some regard "delay," but he is patient with you, not wishing that any should perish but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a mighty roar and the elements will be dissolved by fire, and the earth and everything done on it will be found out.

Since everything is to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be, conducting yourselves in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved in flames and the elements melted by fire. But according to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells. Therefore, beloved, since you await these things, be eager to be found without spot or blemish before him, at peace.

A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."* John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. People of the whole Judean countryside and all the inhabitants of Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins. John was clothed in camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist. He fed on locusts and wild honey. And this is what he proclaimed: "One mightier than I is coming after *me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.*"

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Preparing the Way:

Today's readings spin an exciting, hurry-up, preparing story. They proclaim that the fast-approaching feast of Christmas is a celebration that acknowledges that the story of Christ has not come to an end, that God's concern for us is no less evident, no less real, than it was thousands of years ago. The message of today's liturgy is clear: "Pull out all the stops! Get busy! Get ready!"

Comment:

Today's first reading treats us once again to the powerful words of Isaiah. The mighty Lord, our kindly shepherd, is coming. We must ready ourselves for this long-anticipated advent. We must straighten out our crookedness, plane away our rough edges, broaden our narrowmindedness, fill in our gaps with grace. Then we will be ready to see and receive "the glory of the Lord."

Today's second reading calls for a state of preparation that is analogous to that demanded of those who maintain the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. Once a crew finishes painting the bridge, it simply starts all over again. Peter calls Christians to a similar sort of perpetual preparation. The Lord is coming, but we can't know exactly when. Thus, the "way" of the Lord must remain in a constant condition of readiness, a steady state of repair. Conversion is ongoing. The "new heavens and the new earth" must be just that - new.

The Gospel directly parallels the first reading. Mark seems to admit that he can't do better than Isaiah, so he simply repeats the prophet's words: "Make ready the way of the Lord." How? By adhering to the Baptist's "five R's," that's how: by remembering, reforming, returning, repenting, and reconciling our lives. Such is the grace-filled grammar of readiness for the coming of the Lord.

Reflection:

Minnesota, my home state, has but two seasons: Winter and Road-Repair. The latter, shorter season prepares Minnesotans for the former, longer one, which we are now enjoying.

The season of Road-Repair teaches us patience and composure and gives new meaning to the phrase "You can't get there from here." During this season, patience is not a virtue, it's a fact of life. One waits - till the potholes are filled in, till the bridges are reinforced, till the roads are seal-coated, till the overpasses are repaved. Until all this is done, the way from hither to yon is virtually impassable. We don't necessarily like it, but we know its urgency.

For without the season of Road-Repair, we Minnesotans would not be able to scoff at six-foot snow drifts, look forward to jumpstarting the car, thrill to the adventure of slip-sliding our way to work, nor become such experts at the effects of road salt on auto quarter panels. We may not relish the season of Road-Repair, but we know that it's absolutely essential to prepare us for our favorite season.

Although the smile may limp a bit, the season of Advent for Christians is a lot like that of Road-Repair for Minnesotans. Pope Damasus I presided over the Council of Rome of 382 that determined the scriptural canon, and he commissioned Saint Jerome to translate these texts from Greek into Latin. Mysterious mother of the Americas

On a wall, under glass, is the life-sized image of Our Lady of Guadalupe—enshrined in the Basilica of Guadalupe, on Tepeyac Hill in Mexico City, where Our Lady appeared to Juan Diego in December 1591. As mysterious and symbolic as the Woman of the Apocalypse described in Revelation 12, it continues to defy human explanation, including analysis from a NASA scientist. The humble cactus fiber cloak it appears on hasn't deteriorated in more than 400 years, nor has the image, which experts from Kodak likened to a photograph though photography wasn't invented yet. Countless miracles are associated with Guadalupe, but the greatest is the conversion of an entire continent. Pray for the people of the Americas with the Center of Concern prayer to Our Lady of Guadalupe that begins: Hail Mary, Lady of Peace, We pray for the peace in our world; make us peacemakers. The reward for our faithful acts is the beatific vision. Or as Saint Paul puts it: "We see now in a glass darkly, but then face to face" (I Cor. 13:12). Work to improve your vision.

He wasn't afraid of the dark

Today is the memorial of Saint John of the Cross, a Spanish Carmelite mystic, poet, and reformer who died in 1591. He may be best known for *Dark Night of the Soul*, which develops the idea that suffering—including the sense of God's absence—can actually lead to unity with God. "The endurance of darkness is the preparation for great light," he wrote. John came to his insights through experience, having been maltreated and even imprisoned by his own religious community. If God ever seems far away, let John of the Cross guide you to the light.

Maude Petre, who died on this date in 1937, was a British writer and religious sister best known for her work on Catholic modernism. She was a prolific author, writing on a wide range of topics, including theology, philosophy, politics, and literature. She openly supported women's suffrage, which the church opposed at the time. Her 1907 book *Catholicism and Independence* got her kicked out of her order and she was refused the sacraments by her bishop. Her views were controversial, but they helped form Catholic thinking for the Second Vatican Council. Prayerfully consider that the Catholic controversies of today may lead to the church of tomorrow.
