

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Lenten Reconciliation Opportunities



The Sacrament of Reconciliation (confession) is celebrated every Saturday afternoon from 3:00 to 3:30 p.m. at Saint Mary Church. We will be scheduling an evening later in Lent where a number of priests will be available for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. As soon as this date is set we will post information in the parish bulletin and on our social media sites.

Lent 2024

Reflection Booklet: Each household of the parish is invited to use a daily reflection booklet entitled, "*The Season for Healing Hearts*," by Fr. Joe Sica. Fr. Joe offers a reflection for each day of Lent followed by a practical action, and a short prayer to use throughout your day.

Daily Mass: Join us for daily Mass, Monday through Wednesday, and a Communion Service on Thursday morning. The Scripture readings and prayers of Lent offer much food for thought, prayer, and action. Our individual journeys are supported and strengthened by the prayer and presence of others in community. The daily Mass schedule is slightly adapted for Lent to afford the opportunity for those who work to participate at daily Mass at 1east once during the week. Masses/Communion Service are celebrated at Saint Mark Church. The schedule is as follows:

> Monday – Mass at 8:00 a.m. Tuesday – Mass at 4:30 p.m. Wednesday – Mass at 6:30 p.m.

Thursday - Communion Service at 8:00 a.m.

Stations of the Cross: Stations of the Cross will be prayed each Friday evening of Lent beginning at 7:00 p.m. in Saint Mary Church. Sister Kathee, Deacon Joe, and Fr. Dave will lead the Stations using various themed meditations.

Scripture Study: All are invited to a two-part presentation on the Passion of Jesus as found in Saint Mark's Gospel. Saint Mark's Passion is proclaimed on Palm Sunday this year. Fr. Costa will offer insights on Mark's gospel in general and also focus on the nuances and insights the evangelist offers in his Passion account. The dates for these presentations are: *March 6 & March 13*.

<u>Our Lenten Charity</u>: The three disciplines of Lent – prayer, fasting, and charity – are interwoven. Fasting, is a concrete way of clearing, making space, for prayer and charity. We invite you to choose one or two things (food, "extras," activities) that you will "give up" for the season of Lent. The money you would spend on these would then be donated to our parish Lenten charity.

This year we invite you to support the quickly growing mission of the Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa. Since 1973, Holy Union Sisters have served in education, (primary, secondary and college levels), parish ministry, and religious education. The Sisters also conduct a center for children with physical disabilities/needs, serving both children and families. The Tanzanian area of Holy Union is steadily attracting vocations with over 16 women currently in formation.

In celebration of their fiftieth anniversary of service and presence in Tanzania, the Sisters are focusing on three projects: an autism center, a new formation house, and a health center. Our donations will help further these new endeavors and their ongoing ministries. On Palm Sunday, envelopes for our parish Lenten charity project will be distributed.


Baptismal Preparation Classes Have Resumed

Saint of the Week: Saints Jacinta Marto and Francisco Marto

Just over one hundred years ago, a deadly virus spread throughout the world spreading death, fear, and panic. In 1918 and 1919 the Spanish flu virus infected about 500 million people, one-third of the world population. About 50 million people died during the pandemic, including 675,000 in the United States. During this pandemic, most churches, businesses, and schools closed for several weeks in the United States.

Two siblings from the small village of Fatima, Portugal were among the many who died from the virus. Francisco Marto was 10 and Jacinta Marto was 9 years old. In their brief lives, their spirituality had drawn worldwide attention and inspired many to return to the practice of the Catholic faith.

Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese shepherd children from Aljustrel, received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria, near Fátima, a city 110 miles north of Lisbon. At that time, Europe was involved in an extremely bloody war. Portugal itself was in political turmoil, having overthrown its monarchy in 1910; the government disbanded religious organizations soon after. Along with their cousin Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco asked their local community in 1917 to gather monthly on a rocky cove where they encountered the Blessed Virgin Mary as they prayed the Rosary. At first, the villagers treated their request with deep skepticism and hostility, but large crowds eventually formed for these special moments of prayer. Some attended out of curiosity. Others out of genuine spiritual desire. Over 70,000 were present for the final gathering and experienced a supernatural "miracle of the sun" with the sun seemingly dancing in the sky on October 13, 1917.

The young children encouraged people to rediscover their Catholic faith. To simplify their lives by focusing more on prayer and penance. They spoke directly about the dangers of procrastination and putting off opportunities for spiritual conversion. As the deadly virus spread through Portugal, Francisco and Jacinta practiced what they had preached. They accepted the possibility that they might die from the virus, and spiritually prepared themselves for the possibility of death.

They eventually caught the virus and suffered greatly. Yet, they did not complain. They said they were offering up their sufferings for the conversion of sinners. They treated their suffering as a prayer, an act of love. They united themselves with Jesus on the Cross who offered his painful sufferings as an act of love for humanity. They chose to suffer and die as Jesus did, praying and loving. Francisco died at home on April 4, 1919. Jacinta underwent several interventions at hospitals, including a surgery without anesthesia, and then died alone in a children's hospital on February 20, 1920. They were both canonized saints on May 13, 2017. The site where the children prayed the Rosary with large crowds is now the Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima in Portugal, visited by millions of pilgrims each year. Their feast day is February 20.



For a Change:

We are reminded today that the trouble has passed. The flood waters have receded and new plants are growing. A rainbow spans the sky and connects heaven and the cleansed and renewed earth. God is present in covenant and promise. This knowledge can hold us fast and set us moving all at once. This is the beginning of Lent. It helps a lot to see the end or purpose of Lent, and this Sunday gives us the boost we need.

Comment:

The opening reading from Genesis is surely among the most often told and well-loved. But, for all its charm and easy adaptation for children, the story of Noah carries deep meanings for mature people of faith. This reading tells the story of God's first covenant with the chosen people. The covenant comes as something of a surprise. It is not just a small arrangement between God and Noah's little family. This covenant is explicit, unilateral, and universal. What a great new beginning! This covenant, unbidden and unexpected, is made with Noah after the known world had drowned itself in its own willfulness and sinfulness.

Noah, a just and good man, escaped with his family and a pair of each living creature. Rarely must one begin all over again, but this seems to be the lot of Noah—and of God, too. The reseeded world is the story of a second chance given by a patient God to a faithful man and his family, and alas, his menagerie. The ark floating on the water is a miniature, saved world. Everything that is needed is present.

The first letter of Peter, which is our second reading this Sunday, refers to the story of Noah and uses it to illustrate a new understanding of water in salvation history. Noah's small and sufficient ark escaped "through the water." Peter sees this image of water not as a killing deluge, but as water that supports and sustains. The water to which Peter refers is the water of salvation, not of death.

The Gospel proclamation is so brief we almost miss it. Mark's Gospel assumes a world view that sees Jesus as the Savior, Son of God, and bearer of the Holy Spirit. This Spirit drives Jesus into the waterless desert, where he encounters and no doubt struggles with Satan. This struggle is a cameo of his entire mission of struggling with and finally overcoming the power of evil. For forty days, that is, for a sufficient time, Jesus takes on and subdues the power of evil.

Jesus then emerges, almost explodes, into the unsuspecting and relatively tranquil world of Palestine. He comes among a people going about their daily business and announces a time of fulfillment. A fresh, new day is upon us, he announces. God is here and seeks our repentance and our faith.

Reflection:

Jesus tells the people of his homeland that the reign of God is at hand. That is the main issue. He doesn't first remind them of their destructive ways. Jesus is definitely not the hell-and-brimstone preacher the self-righteous seem to think most of us deserve to hear. Jesus does not spend his time bawling us out, as it were. Rather, he first sets before us promise and fullness, and only then does he ask us to take it in and take on the work of conversion.

The reign of God is at hand, and we need only to open our hands to seize it. Our hands cannot be shaped to fists, and though a kind of dying must occur, we need not face it with white-knuckle determination, as if everything depended on us. We begin well when we focus on what is to be gained, not on what is to be given up. Only by focusing on the end of the lenten journey—Easter—will we be able to muster the courage and persistence needed for renunciation and repentance. All of the readings insist on this: God's promise to Noah and to the whole earth; Peter's reminder that we are saved through the baptismal waters; and finally, Jesus' announcement of the reign of God among us.

WHY IT MATTERS

Since the first century, the bishop of the local church in Rome has been understood to possess the "Chair of Peter," which endows great authority and carries the role of special keeper of the church's mission.

The power of the **papacy** stems from Jesus' choice to set Peter in authority over the rest: "You are Peter and upon this rock I will build my church." (Matthew 16:18). Papal primacy and the role of the pope as Vicar of Christ and pastor of the whole Church, with "full, supreme and universal power over the Church" was confirmed at numerous ecumenical councils, including Vatican II (*Lumen gentium*, 22).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What are the qualifications for being pope?

The vast majority of popes were ordained. Priesthood is a plus, topped off with a hearty Roman education at a pontifical institute. Doing time in highly visible chanceries in large cities increases your chances. Attaining the status of bishop and cardinal tremendously increases your odds even though neither position is canonically required.

Medieval and renaissance popes had the advantages of coming from princely or aristocratic Roman families, but never mind if you don't have a fine pedigree. Sixtus V was the son of a laundress, and Pius X the child of a seamstress. A few popes were renowned preachers like the Franciscan Sixtus IV, and others were lawyers, professors, and poets. But just as many had their beginnings as monks, anchorites, and even a hermit (Celestine V, but he abdicated to return to his hermitage after six months).

Though being extraordinarily wicked hasn't always been a deal-breaker, more than a few popes were martyred or popularly acclaimed as saints. Holiness is a great asset. Wanting to be pope probably isn't.
