

Lent 2024

Daily Mass: Join us for daily Mass, Monday through Wednesday, and a Communion Service on Thursday morning. The Scripture readings and prayers of Lent offer much food for thought, prayer, and action. Our individual journeys are supported and strengthened by the prayer and presence of others in community. The daily Mass schedule is slightly adapted for Lent to afford the opportunity for those who work to participate at daily Mass at least once during the week. Masses/Communion Service are celebrated at Saint Mark Church. The schedule is as follows:

Stations of the Cross: Join us this Friday, March 1, as we pray Stations of the Cross in Saint Mary Church beginning at 7:00 p.m. Sister Kathee will lead this week's prayer and reflections. All are invited.

Lenten Bible Study: Fr. Costa will present part one of a two-part study of the passion account as found in the Gospel of Saint Mark, next Wednesday, March 6, beginning at 7:00 p.m. in Saint Mark Church. The Passion of Saint Mark is the gospel in which we participate on Palm Sunday this year. A copy of the gospel account will be distributed at the class. All are invited! We will meet upstairs in the church.

Our Lenten Charity: Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania,

Africa: The Holy Union Sisters, who have served in North Attleborough since 1923, first began ministering in Tanzania in 1973 when two Sisters from the Anglo-Hibernian Province, Sisters Aquinas and Adriana, arrived to teach at the Maua seminary. Eventually the number of Sister missionaries grew, including Sr. Eleanor McNally, from Fall River, MA. Their work focused mainly on education.

One of the fruits of this ministry was the attraction many young women had to join Holy Union. Beginning in 1993, the Sisters began welcoming native Tanzanians who were interested in joining the Holy Union Sisters. Over the past ten years the number of vocations has steadily grown. Today there are 16 women discerning their vocation or in formation for profession of vows. This past October 12th, three native Tanzanians professed perpetual vows.

In order to encourage vocations and provide for formation, the Sisters are planning to construct a pre-novitiate house in Tanzania. As Holy Union becomes better known through ministry and presence throughout Tanzania, as well as active vocation promotion, there is need for a place to welcome and train future members. The Sisters first seek our prayers for these enthusiastic and dedicated young women who are discerning God's call in their lives. Secondly, donations received from our Lenten collection will assist the Sisters in building this center and providing the formation that is needed for young religious.


Saint of the Week: Saint Gregory of Narek Feast Day: February 27th

Gregory was born in a village on the shores of Lake Van between 945 and 950. When his parents died, Gregory and his older brother were raised by a scholarly uncle who had them educated at the Narek monastery where he was a monk. The monastery was a prominent center of learning located in what is now Turkey. Gregory too entered the monastery and was ordained in 977.

A professor of theology, Gregory wrote a mystical interpretation of the Song of Songs, and a long mystical poem called the Book of Prayer or the Book of Lamentations. He described his poem as "an encyclopedia of prayer for all nations." This classic of Armenian literature has been translated into 30 languages. The Russian text of the Book of Lamentations was set to music in 1985. Little else is known about Gregory, other than he died in the early 11th century and was buried within the walls of the Narek monastery where he had spent his life.

As opposed to the Armenian Catholic Church that began in the 17th century, the earlier Armenian Apostolic Church did not accept the Council of Chalcedon's (convened in the year 451) teaching that Christ was fully divine and fully human. In 1996, St. John Paul II and Apostolic Catholicos Karekin I signed a declaration confirming the common faith of their two Churches. Prayer often unites groups of people who have seen themselves as very distinct—even enemies.

In 2015 as the world observed the 100th anniversary of the Armenian genocide in the Ottoman Empire, Pope Francis concelebrated a Mass at the Vatican with Patriarch Nerses Bedros XIX Tarmouni and declared the monk, poet, and saint of the Armenian Apostolic Church, Gregory of Narek, a Doctor of the Church. His liturgical feast is celebrated on February 27.

SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

Comment:

Today we hear of powerful, energizing promises fulfilled. We read of life drawn from a situation that portends cruel death. These stories take us to two summits—Mount Moriah of Abraham's nightmare, and Mount Tabor of Jesus' transfiguration. First, Abraham, our father in faith. We recall that he uprooted his family and journeyed from present-day Iraq across the Fertile Crescent to an unknown land. Abraham, who faltered and grew weary, moved steadily forward on the singular promise that his and Sarah's children would be as numerous as the stars on clear, cool nights and as many as the sands they could see in the burning and shadowless desert. Abraham and Sarah finally and at long last have the child of God's promise, a son named Isaac. And now, Abraham understands that this son is to be offered up—by Abraham himself. Mercifully, we are given a happy ending here. The mysterious God whom Abraham apprehends is not like the neighboring Canaanite gods, who demand human sacrifice. In the end, Abraham understands that God asks obedience and even sacrifice, but not this kind of sacrifice. Abraham's trust in God is absolute. God asks for and receives Abraham's fidelity, which is richly rewarded in his posterity—the twelve tribes of Israel. This first reading is set before us to heighten and enhance the layered meanings of the Gospel itself. For the Gospel also brings us to a mountaintop, this time Mount Tabor. Here three of Jesus' closest apostles—Peter, James, and John—are privileged to witness the vision of Jesus with Elijah and Moses. These two represent the whole of the Hebrew prophetic and patriarchal tradition. On this apex, heaven and earth meet, and the former and new dispensation meet also. Again, God's voice is heard, and it speaks again of sonship. On Mount Moriah, God's words rang in Abraham's ears, reminding him that Isaac is his son, his only son. Here the voice of God introduces Jesus as "my beloved Son." This ecstatic experience is so stunning and attractive that Peter would like it to go on forever. This is a deeply human response. As yet, the apostles do not know they will need all the inner strength they can summon as this Son, this beloved Son, enters into his passion and death

Reflection:

In the second reading, Paul asks the rhetorical question, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" We are tempted to say that plenty can be against us! Perhaps on our better or easier days we can see that God is on our side. But not always. Like the three who were with Jesus on the top of Mount Tabor, we see and we do not seeor we forget. After Jesus' death and resurrection, the apostles will remember and grow to understand this mix of death and life that transpired from that first Good Friday to that first Easter Sunday. On Friday, the apostles surely recalled who was against them. They succumbed to those forces, in fact. They subsequently recovered their balance, however, because God was for them and with them. They were forgiven, granted peace, and commissioned to preach the gospel. The resurrection of Jesus provided the light and the life that the apostles could live by. The vision on Mount Tabor offered a glimpse of the full life of God attained in the death and resurrection to come. The image on Mount Tabor hinted at the life of the risen Lord, who broke all boundaries and exceeded all dreams. Though God spared Abraham's only son, the Son of God was not spared. The zenith on Mount Tabor eventually is balanced by the nadir of the Garden of Olives, where Jesus prayed for deliverance. But ultimately, the glory prefigured in the Transfiguration will be the fate of all believers, just as it was for Jesus Christ. Jesus loved his life as dearly as we love ours. Yet he also recognized God's will and what was worth dying for. His embrace of his own death was equal to his embrace of God's words, "This is my beloved Son." For us, it is difficult to keep the seeming extremes of life and death in balance. Though our faith teaches us that life can come through death, we resist mightily. We need the vision of the Transfiguration to sustain us; we need the power of the Resurrection to strengthen us. We can find no better inspiration than our Lord Jesus Christ, the beloved Son, who has shown us the way through death to life.

WORD OF THE WEEK

Agnus Dei \äg-nus-'dā\

Latin term for "Lamb of God." A title given to Jesus by John the Baptist (John 1:29); the litany sung or said by the assembly at Mass before Communion ("Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world...") introduced into the Roman Rite in the seventh century by Pope Sixtus; an image of a lamb often with a halo and a banner and cross used as a symbol of Christ; a wax disc sacramental.

CONTEXT

Either sin is with you, lying on your shoulders, or it is lying on Christ, the **Lamb of God** [Agnus Dei]. Now if it is lying on your back, you are lost; but if it is resting on Christ, you are free, and you will be saved. Choose what you want.

—Martin Luther

The address to the **Lamb of God** does not refer to Christ simply, but rather to Christ present in the Eucharist as a sacrificial offering.

WHY IT MATTERS

The Passover lamb is the symbol of God's people passing over from slavery and death to freedom and life (Exodus 12). A "lamb led to slaughter" is Isaiah's prophesy of God's faithful servant (Isaiah 53:70). The victorious Lamb in Revelation is the light of God's holy city (Revelation 21:9-22:5). With all of salvation history as its backdrop, the **Agnus Dei** epitomizes the sacrifice of Jesus who achieves our freedom from sin and death. "It is love to the end," says the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "that confers on Christ's sacrifice its value as redemption and reparation, as atonement and satisfaction (616).

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What is the meaning of the Transfiguration?

Gospel Greek deliberately avoids the term *metamorphosis* in this account, an attempt to sever any "pagan" comparison. The brilliance of Jesus' face; the enveloping cloud, and Peter's suggestion of pitching tents evokes significant encounters Moses had with the Holy Presence. The simultaneous appearance of Moses and Elijah, representatives of Law and Prophecy, reinforce these anchors to the Hebrew story.

So what's it doing in the New Testament? Scholars offer three possibilities. One is that this event is the Gospel of Mark's misplaced Resurrection story. The second idea is that this story is a theological reflection of the first-generation church: a symbolic way of reconstructing what Jesus means to them. The third theory is that the Transfiguration is a private vision of Peter in which the truth about Jesus "came together" for him and shaped his understanding of the Second Coming before or even well after Easter. What's our final takeaway? Saint Paul declares that we will all be transfigured if we keep our sights trained on Christ.
