

Lenten Bible Study:

This Wednesday evening, **March 13**, Fr. Costa will present part 2 of a two-part study of Saint Mark's gospel and in particular, the Passion account found therein. The Passion of Saint Mark's gospel is the gospel we will participate in at our Palm Sunday Masses this year. Having a knowledge and understanding of this Marcan text can greatly assist as we enter into the most holy days of our Church year.

Fr. Dave's presentation will be held upstairs at Saint Mark Church beginning at 7:00 p.m. this Wednesday. Reminder: Mass will be celebrated at 6:30 p.m. The presentation should last approximately one hour. The text of the gospel will be provided, so you need not bring your Bible. Even if you were not able to join us last Wednesday for part 1, please feel free to participate this week. Review materials will be available.

Our Lenten Charity: The Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania:

In addition to staffing schools, the center for disabled children, and the house of formation, the Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania also offer a ministry of presence and support to a wide variety of people. The Sisters help university and college students from poor families with bridging loans and fees so they may remain in school. They reach out to the local primary schools, overpopulated and under-resourced, where the younger Sisters work as volunteers, helping to reduce the pupil-teacher ratio. They sometimes provide books and teaching aids, as well as laptop computers and printers. Sports equipment and musical instruments have also been provided by the Sisters. Holy Union works in solidarity and friendship with their Muslim colleagues and neighbors, promoting understanding and unity.

The Sisters also help those in need with food, rent and basic requirements. They assist the elderly with health care and reach out to those elders who are caring for orphaned or abandoned children. Single mothers with dependent children are assisted with school uniforms and school supplies. The Sisters are also helping women with small grants or loans to generate income for their families. In Tanzania there are no unemployment benefits, little or no old age pension, and little to no health insurance. The Sisters, through their generous benefactors in England and Ireland, and now us in North Attleborough, assist with life's emergencies and struggles, bringing joy and hope into the lives of individuals and families. As the Sisters say in native Swahili:

Mungu awabaiki sana...may God bless you abundantly!

An Examination of Conscience



An Examination of Conscience is a way to think, pray, and prepare for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Here are some specific questions to think about and perhaps share in confession:

Selfish

Have I ignored people around me and only cared about myself? Have I chosen what I wanted even if it hurt others?

Dishonest

Have I been untruthful with myself or others? Have I lied to anyone on purpose? Have I taken something that was not rightfully mine?

Greedy

Have I been unwilling to share what I have with other people, especially those in need - such as my time, my money, my love? Have I only wanted more for me?

Disrespectful

Have I been disrespectful to myself, God, and others, especially to my parents and family members, friends, people in authority, people who are different than me?

Uncaring

Have I been too busy to care when people needed me when they needed someone to listen to them, care about them, share with them? Have I been insensitive to people around me?

Jealous

Have I been jealous of other people or their possessions and not appreciated the gifts I have in my own life?

Hurtful

Have I put people down and made fun of others just to feel better about myself? Have I hurt others physically or through violence in my words?

Untrustworthy

Have I broken trust with anyone, and not done what I said I would? Have I shared something that was told to me in confidence? Have I gossiped?

Unforgiving

Have I been unforgiving with people who have hurt me? Have I prevented reconciliation with others or held a grudge?

Apathetic

Have I been apathetic in my relationship with God and with others? Has my attitude been negative?

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First Reading

A reading from the second Book of Chronicles

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem.

Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy. Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled."

In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cyrus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of the earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!"

For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Salvation:

Salvation is all but unimaginable. It is unconditional, unfettered, no-strings-attached love. It is a love no one can earn. It is a boon, freely given, reserved for lovers. It is powerful, powerful enough to bring life out of death.

Comment:

The reading from 2 Chronicles highlights the faithfulness of God, even though God's people were unfaithful. In faithful love, God sent messengers and prophets to warn Israel, to call the people to faithfulness, and to love God in return. These overtures were spurned. Because of Israel's infidelity and lack of love, Jerusalem was destroyed, the people lost their home, and the nation was taken into captivity. Still, God remains faithful and loving. In their suffering, the people recognize this. God's anger abates, and God extends salvation from a totally unexpected source through Cyrus, a foreign conqueror. The promise of a new Jerusalem and a rebuilt temple is given. Salvation comes from the loving hand of God and the people are brought home safe.

In his Letter to the Ephesians, Paul reemphasizes God's faithfulness and abiding love. Even in the face of our sins, God loves us and rescues us through the suffering and death of Christ. Paul stresses that we are alive because of Christ; salvation is sure if we have faith in him. John's Gospel rounds out this Sunday's treatise on the salvation that comes to us through the love of God. The evangelist makes it abundantly clear that it is through the Son of God, the firstfruit of God's love, that the light of salvation is now ours. At the same time, John warns us that we must not flee the light, but embrace it. God's love seeks the response of acting in the light and living in truth. Only by such living do we recognize the salvation that God extends to us in our lives, in the sacraments, in the Church. Only then will we come to live secure in God's saving light, safe at home at last.

Reflection:

Some dramatists deal with the meaning of life by giving us a glimpse of it from the side of death. In the classic play by Thornton Wilder, Our Town, dead characters speak to one another about the meaning of life. When a young woman who has died in childbirth joins their number and voices her desire to return to visit the living, her deceased companions counsel her not to do so. In spite of their advice, the young woman returns to the scene of her life. She discovers that the living really do not prize the gifts of life at all. She returns to her companions in death, who do understand and appreciate life's worth.

We need not succumb to physical death to recognize the meaning and import of life. Rather, as today's readings remind us, we need but die to old ways of living and accept the gift of salvation that God offers us. This means recognizing that salvation—new life—is not something that comes after this life or something that is divorced or isolated from life. Rather, it is intrinsically linked to life, to real, everyday, even humdrum life. Salvation does not happen somewhere "beyond" the pale of physical life or apart from the mundane. It happens here and now. That's the whole meaning of the Incarnation, isn't it? All things are God-touched, packed with salvation, gifts waiting for our acceptance, our treasuring, our enjoyment, and our sharing with others.

If we believe God loves us and loves us first, what a difference that "truth" will make in our lives and what "light" that truth will bring to our lives! The God we dare to believe in loves us no matter what. The God we dare to believe in rends the heavens with a divine and loving invitation to come home. All we need do is respond to the call and come live with God in Christ, safe at home forever.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

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Will my faith make me happy?

The biblical idea of happiness is linked to *beatitude* (Latin for "bliss"). Jesus offers beatitudes in his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's gospel. Often the primary word of each beatitude is translated as *blessed*. A more literal rendering might be the cry, "Happy you!" who are just, pure of heart, merciful, a peacemaker, and so on. God is the source of happiness, therefore doing as God does brings bliss.

So, the short answer to the question is, yes, living according to God's will makes you happy. It's the only thing, in fact, that does; or as Saint Thomas Aquinas declared, "God alone satisfies." Saint Paul lists **joy** as one of nine fruits of the Holy Spirit. Saint Francis de Sales went so far as to warn against giving in to excessive sadness as it's a counter-witness to the **joy** that comes in the life of faith.
