

Lenten Charity: Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa:

Over the past weeks of Lent, we have highlighted the ministry of the Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania. Since 1973, Sisters have served in education (elementary, high school, and college levels), parish ministry, and social services. The Sisters also conduct a center for children with physical disabilities/needs which serves both children and their families. The Tanzanian area of the Holy Union congregation is one of the fastest growing areas for vocations to religious life, with over 16 women in formation.

A few years ago, at the request of the people of the village of Churwi, where the Sisters conduct a school, Holy Union donated a parcel of land near the school for a Health Center. The locals struggled to build a foundation and unfortunately failed to proceed with the building. The Sisters have now stepped in, advocating with both local and regional government agencies to help the people to access their right to a health service.

The population of the village has grown significantly to over seven thousand people, with two thousand primary school children. When Holy Union built the primary school in 2008 (through the generosity of their Irish benefactors), the pupil population was 59! More classrooms and toilets are sorely needed. Despite those physical limitations, the school is one of the most successful primary schools in the entire district. Our generous donations will assist in both the building of the Health Center and the expansion of the school in Churwi.



Saint of the Week: Saint Patrick

Legends about Patrick abound; but truth is best served by our seeing two solid qualities in him: He was humble and he was courageous. The determination to accept suffering and success with equal indifference guided the life of God's instrument for winning most of Ireland for Christ.

Details of his life are uncertain. Current research places his dates of birth and death a little later than earlier accounts. Patrick may have been born in Dunbarton, Scotland, Cumberland, England, or in northern Wales. He called himself both a Roman and a Briton. At 16, he and a large number of his father's slaves and vassals were captured by Irish raiders and sold as slaves in Ireland. Forced to work as a shepherd, he suffered greatly from hunger and cold.

After six years Patrick escaped, probably to France, and later returned to Britain at the age of 22. His captivity had meant spiritual conversion. He may have studied at Lerins, off the French coast; he spent years at Auxerre, France, and was consecrated bishop at the age of 43. His great desire was to proclaim the good news to the Irish.

In a dream vision it seemed "all the children of Ireland from their mothers' wombs were stretching out their hands" to him. He understood the vision to be a call to do mission work in pagan Ireland. Despite opposition from those who felt his education had been defective, he was sent to carry out the task. He went to the west and north– where the faith had never been preached–obtained the protection of local kings and made numerous converts.


Because of the island's pagan background, Patrick was emphatic in encouraging widows to remain chaste and young women to consecrate their virginity to Christ. He ordained many priests, divided the country into dioceses, held Church councils, founded several monasteries and continually urged his people to greater holiness in Christ.

He suffered much opposition from pagan druids and was criticized in both England and Ireland for the way he conducted his mission. In a relatively short time, the island had experienced deeply the Christian spirit, and was prepared to send out missionaries whose efforts were greatly responsible for Christianizing Europe.

Patrick was a man of action, with little inclination toward learning. He had a rock-like belief in his vocation, in the cause he had espoused. One of the few certainly authentic writings is his Confessio, above all an act of homage to God for having called Patrick, unworthy sinner, to the apostolate. What distinguishes Patrick is the durability of his efforts. When one considers the state of Ireland when he began his mission work, the vast extent of his labors, and how the seeds he planted continued to grow and flourish, one can only admire the kind of man Patrick must have been. The holiness of a person is known only by the fruits of his or her work.

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Comment:

In today's first reading, Jeremiah, who had seen the fall of Jerusalem, now predicts its rise and the reestablishment of God's people. Those in exile will return home. The uprooted will be replanted. God will make a new covenant written not on tablets of stone, but on hearts of flesh. In other words, the will of God will not be something imposed from without, but something discovered from within. What's so radically "new" about this covenant, then, is its universality. No longer shall God's will and law be the purview of a few "chosen;" it shall be accessible to each and every person—to all people: "All, from least to greatest, shall know me, says the LORD."

Likewise, this new covenant will not rely on the fidelity of fickle people but on the constancy of the God of faithfulness. Because of this new covenant, all people will know, from the bottom of their hearts, that God is their God and that they are God's own. This new covenant will be so powerful as to cause the God of all remembrance to forget—to forget the sins and failings of God's people—to forget and to forgive. This new covenant is ours if we but open our hearts. And how do we open our hearts? The author of the letter to the Hebrews gives an answer, but it is not a simple one: obedience, a word most of us do not like to hear. Yet the personification of the new covenant, Jesus Christ, is also the personification of perfect obedience, obedience to death, even to death on a cross. Only the openhearted can afford to obey. Only the openhearted can trust enough to obey. Today's second reading calls us to be openhearted, to trust enough to walk in the footsteps of Jesus Christ. Through such obedience, salvation is guaranteed. We claim our share in the benefits of the new covenant by doing as Christ did, that is, by becoming obedient to him, by dying and rising as he did.

The Gospel graphically demonstrates the meaning of God's new covenant and the obedience it requires. Only through obedience will the grain become what it was meant to become. Only through obedience will the covenant flower. John tells us that Jesus himself is the seed who is buried and dies in obedience to God's will. Then, when John relates that Jesus says, "Whoever serves me must follow me ... The Father will honor whoever serves me," the evangelist is telling us that the covenant established by Jesus' death and resurrection is our covenant if we but follow Jesus in obedient service. Here John is inviting us to claim our share in the paschal mystery, the source and proof of the new covenant, and to realize that the salvation wrought by adherence to the covenant is no cheap grace. It will require sacrifice and suffering. Jesus himself will suffer, will give himself over to death as does a grain of wheat, only to rise, blossom, and produce grain on which others may feed. John reminds us that such is the lot of all who, through obedience, claim a share in the covenant-a dying, to be sure, but then a resurrection to a new and more glorious life.

Reflection:

Obedience is not a popular term these days. To our ears, obedience smacks too much of subservience, of giving up and giving over one's free will. And yet, Jesus was clearly the model of obedience. Can we really claim that Jesus is our model, too? We can if, like Jesus, we recognize that God's new covenant with us is one that is heartfelt and heart-written. We can if we realize that God's new covenant with us is one that asks no limits of and places no limits on us. Then, as heart of our hearts, God's new covenant will surely lead us to obedience. It will prompt us to give of ourselves to others, to be "lifted up" for others, even to die for others, all for the sake of the love that exists both between us and God and among all of us whose hearts God has embraced.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What do we know about Saint Joseph?

In terms of facts, almost nothing. Matthew alone highlights Joseph's role. Here we meet Joseph the dreamer who, like his namesake in Genesis, learns of heaven's purposes while he sleeps. The earliest gospel calls the adult Jesus "son of Mary" rather than "son of Joseph." Luke and John prefer to call Jesus "son of Joseph." However, Luke adds, "as was thought." Joseph's last appearance is when Jesus is 12. Jesus is called the carpenter's son, revealing his father's occupation. Tradition says Joseph died when Jesus was 18 with the art of the Eastern Church depicting the death of Joseph.

Matthew describes Joseph as a righteous man who considers divorcing his pregnant betrothed. Then heaven intervenes. Joseph takes Mary home and gives her his full protection. It's an enormous concession to the divine will, especially crediting Mary's perpetual virginity. We always want more from Joseph. He's already given quite a lot.
