

<u>Lenten Charity</u>: Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa

As announced at the beginning of Lent, our common, parish charity for Lent will be the ministries of the Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa. The people of North Attleborough have had a connection with the Holy Union since the Sisters first arrived 100 years ago to staff the new Sacred Heart School. That relationship continues in the person of Sister Kathee, our pastoral associate. Kathee also serves on the two-person Leadership Team for the United States area of Holy Union and has met the Sisters who serve in Tanzania and can attest to both the great need for financial support and assistance and the exciting potential for growth and development in this African nation.

The Tanzanian area of the Holy Union congregation was founded in 1973, when two Sisters from the Anglo-Hibernian Province arrived to do education work. The number of Sisters and the works they are conducting have increased significantly over these fifty years. Our financial sacrifices/gifts will be used specifically for three projects the Sisters have designated during this their Jubilee year: an Autism Unit at the Matumaini Center the Sisters conduct for children with physical disabilities; a Novitiate House for the growing number of young women who are seeking to become Holy Union Sisters. At present there are 16 native Tanzanians in formation; and a Health Centre in the village of Churwi, adjacent to a primary school (2,000 pupils) the Sisters conduct.

With today's bulletin you will find a large white envelope marked: "Lenten Collection 2024." You are invited to use this envelope when making your Lenten sacrifice donation for the good works of the Sisters in Tanzania. Envelopes may be dropped in the collection basket at weekend Mass, dropped at the parish office, or sent through the mail. If you are writing a check, please make the check out to Transfiguration of the Lord Parish. When all of the funds are collected, the parish will write one single check to the Holy Union Sisters.

Many, many thanks for your consideration and participation in this parish Lenten project. By supporting the ministries and formation of the Sisters in Tanzania, we are remembering that we belong to a global Church. In this international Faith community, we support each other with our prayer and our resources. We are so blessed here in North Attleborough. Let us share our blessings – generously – with this growing, enthusiastic, and energetic region of our Church!

Last week a special guest, Michael Ryan, from the Office of The Jury Commission in Boston, visited our 5th & 6th grade Saints. Mr. Ryan enthusiastically shared his message about why it is important to go to jury duty when you are summoned. In addition to his slideshow about the history and significance of the jury, Mr. Ryan led a mock trial using a script with roles including potential jurors, a judge, a court officer, a defendant, the defendant's lawyer, a prosecution, a clerk and witnesses. After such a powerful presentation, we are confident that these students will commit to jury duty when they are summoned now that they have further insight on this important citizen responsibility!

Saint of the Week: Saint Oscar Romero

The night before he was murdered while celebrating Mass, Archbishop Oscar Romero of San Salvador said on the radio: "I would like to appeal in a special way to the men of the army, and in particular to the troops of the National Guard, the police, and the garrisons. Brothers, you belong to our own people. You kill your own brother peasants; and in the face of an order to kill that is given by a man, the law of God that says 'Do not kill!' should prevail. "No soldier is obliged to obey an order counter to the law of God. No one has to comply with an immoral law. It is the time now that you recover your conscience and obey its dictates rather than the command of sin. . . . Therefore, in the name of God, and in the name of this long-suffering people, whose laments rise to heaven every day more tumultuous, I beseech you, I beg you, I command you! In the name of God: 'Cease the repression!'"


Simultaneously, Romero had eloquently upheld the gospel and effectively signed his own death warrant. The next morning, as he held the chalice aloft during the Eucharistic Prayer at Mass, Archbishop Romero was shot dead.

When he was appointed archbishop of San Salvador in 1977, Bishop Romero was considered a very "safe" choice. He had served as auxiliary bishop there for four years before his three years as bishop of Santiago de Maria. Oscar's father wanted him to be a carpenter—a trade for which he demonstrated some talent. Seminary classes in El Salvador preceded his studies at Rome's Gregorian University and his ordination in 1942. After earning a doctorate in ascetical theology, he returned home and became a parish priest and later rector of an inter-diocesan seminary.

Three weeks after his appointment as archbishop, Romero was shaken by the murder of his good friend, Jesuit Father Rutilio Grande, a vigorous defender of the rights of the poor. Five more priests were assassinated in the Archdiocese of San Salvador during Romero's years as its shepherd.

When a military junta seized control of the national government in 1979, Archbishop Romero publicly criticized the US government for backing the junta. His weekly radio sermons, broadcast throughout the country, were regarded by many as the most trustworthy source of news available.

Romero's funeral was celebrated in the plaza outside the cathedral and drew an estimated 250,000 mourners. His tomb in the cathedral crypt soon drew thousands of visitors each year. On February 3, 2015, Pope Francis authorized a decree recognizing Oscar Romero as a martyr for the faith. His beatification took place in San Salvador on May 23, 2015, and he was canonized on October 14, 2018.

When Jesus and his disciples drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately on entering it, you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone should say to you, 'Why are you doing this?' reply, 'The Master has need of it and will send it back here at once." 

PALM SUNDAY OF THE LORD'S PASSION

The Passion of Jesus Christ:

The Passion of Christ is not simply a record of Jesus' suffering and death. It is a process through which all of us must go, indeed, are privileged to go. The reason we undertake the annual lenten pilgrimage is to get somewhere. Easter is that somewhere, but there is no Easter without Jesus' passion. Neither is there an Easter in our lives without our sharing in that Passion. But to what sort of passion are we summoned? Are we to be betrayed, abandoned by friends, condemned, and put to physical death? For some of us, the answer may be yes. But for all of us, the passion we are called to share mirrors Jesus' passion in a way that, while not so concrete, is nonetheless very real. We are called to share the passion of letting go of selfish desires, of grasping, of being pretentious, of wearing masks. The Passion of Christ calls us to become vulnerable as Jesus was vulnerable, to wear our hearts on our sleeves, to forgive rather than to seek revenge, to call out resolutely for wholeness and not for division, and to give ourselves over completely to life.

Comment

In the first reading, Isaiah speaks of the fulfillment of God's covenant in terms of the actions of God's humiliated Servant, who will ultimately be exalted. The meaning of this passage from humiliation to glorification—from death to life—is made clear in the great hymn to Christ that makes up the reading from Philippians. Like the Suffering Servant, Jesus is obedient, even to accepting a humiliating death. However, because of Jesus' obedience, God glorifies him and bestows upon him his true identity: Messiah and Lord.

The Gospel takes the symbolism of the first reading and the poetry of the second and gives them flesh and blood. The Servant of God, taking on our flesh, suffers and dies that God's new covenant might take root in our hearts and lead us through death to life, safe and at home with God.

Mark's account of Jesus Christ's passion records the events leading to his death with tragic and horrid realism. Like the rapid fire of a machine gun, Mark quickly relates Jesus' cruel betrayal, denial, condemnation, and humiliation. Tersely, he describes Jesus' suffering and crucifixion. Hanging against the darkening sky, Jesus is taunted for his trust and obedience: "Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." As if anything, save death, could melt such hardness of heart.

Jesus does not do anything so simple as descend from the cross. He performs no conjurer's trick. He dies. And by his death he gives life to fledgling faith—"Truly this man was the Son of God!"—and new hearts to all the world.

Reflection:

Of the Passion accounts, Mark's is the most concrete, the most blunt. It is unadorned tragedy. Thus, it is all too easy for us to become overwhelmed or blinded by it, to be unable to look beyond the events it relates with the eyes of faith. The Passion is a tragedy, but it is also a story of glory. That is why we read the Passion today, the first day of the week we call "holy."

The Passion of Jesus Christ sets the tone for all that takes place this week: the reconciliation of sinners, the commemoration of the Passover and the first Eucharist, the veneration of the cross, the expectant vigiling, the welcoming and initiation of the elect, the bright light and overwhelming joy of Easter. The Passion of Jesus Christ leads us to all these. The Passion of Jesus Christ enables us to recognize God present in the humiliations and failings of life. The Passion of Jesus Christ makes any passion we may undergo "holy."

WORD OF THE WEEK

Prostration \prä-'strā-shən\

Lying face down in a ritual expressing humility, reverence, and submission. Used in the liturgy of ordination, it is also the posture assumed during the entrance ritual on Good Friday when priests and ministers proceed in silence and then reverence the altar before all assembled with a full **prostration**.

CONTEXT

Prostration can carry the symbolism of death—the death to self that comes before the candidate's rebirth into priestly service. —*Beafriar.org website*

[The Magi] saw the child with Mary his mother. They **prostrated** themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts.

In Hebrew the root of the word for "dismayed" can also mean "**prostrate**." That's what dismay and fear do. They take the legs from under us.

WHY IT MATTERS

Postures are powerful. We say much without saying a word. Genuflection and kneeling demonstrate respect. The Asian kowtow—kneeling while touching forehead to the ground—is a deeper display of reverence. The rare full **prostration** symbolizes total submission to God alone. The ultimate **prostration** of Jesus on the cross brings about our salvation.

From the Circular Letter Concerning the Preparation and Celebration of the Easter Feasts: This act of **prostration** [on Good Friday], signifies both the abasement of "earthly man" and also the grief and sorrow of the Church.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What is humility?

Humility is just about the exact opposite of everything you see in the world nowadays! To discover the essentials of humility, you have to experiment with self-emptying. Humility recognizes that everything comes from God and belongs to God. Therefore, to God alone go all praise, honor, and glory. When you begin with God and not with yourself, your perspective on reality does a dramatic shift. God's will comes first. "Not my will, but yours be done," as Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane.

When you choose the perspective of a humble heart, you become aware that your proper orientation as creatures should be one of obedience—that is, attentive listening—to God's call. It's precisely the attitude of obedience that led to the salvation of the world, as Saint Paul tells us: "[Jesus] humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross." Paul explains that humility means putting other people ahead of yourself, thinking of their needs rather than yours. That is so countercultural, jaws will drop whenever you attempt it.
