

The Stations are prayed at 7:00 p.m. in Saint Mary Church. All are invited to join us!

Lent 2024

Lenten Bible Study: This Wednesday evening, **March 6**, Fr. Costa will present part 1 of a two part study of Saint Mark's gospel and in particular, the Passion account found therein. The Passion of Saint Mark's gospel is the gospel we will participate in at our Palm Sunday Masses this year. Having a knowledge and understanding of this Marcan text can greatly assist as we enter into the most holy days of our Church year.

Fr. Dave's presentation will be held upstairs at Saint Mark Church beginning at 7:00 p.m. this Wednesday. Reminder: Mass will be celebrated at 6:30 p.m. The presentation should last approximately one hour. The text of the gospel will be provided, so you need not bring your Bible.

Our Lenten Charity: The Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa: In 2009, Sister Adriana, one of the first Holy Union missionaries in Tanzania, received a request from a group of women with children who had severe disabilities to provide them a Centre where these children could be helped and their families find resources and support. Since its founding, the Centre has seen remarkable success and growth, serving well over 200 children/families this year with a staff of 21 lay workers and Sisters.

The Matumaini Centre provides physiotherapy four days a week. In addition, the children receive nutritional support and fresh milk daily. The Centre also provides help and support with hard to acquire equipment such as splints, wheelchairs, special chairs, corner chairs, walking frames, and yes, even toys! A workshop sponsored by the Centre provides equipment at a more affordable cost than elsewhere.

When the children first arrive at the Centre, the children cannot do much. Little by little, they learn life skills: how to brush their teeth, go to the toilet independently, walk, socialize, and play. Eventually, many join a classroom group. In addition to working directly with the children, the staff provides help and guidance to parents and family members, teaching various skills so as to generate some income to help their families as well as offering instruction in physiotherapy and care to be given at home.

Over the years, the Matumaini Centre has been helping to reduce the stigma around physical handicap and is fighting against superstition and witchcraft in the Tanzanian society. All of this wonderful work is done with no financial help from any government agency!

One of the jubilee projects of the Sister's is the addition of an Autism Unit at the Centre. A half -built house on the property will be completed and converted to classrooms and offices. The staff will study the autism spectrum and learn how to support parents whose children exhibit ASD symptoms in early childhood. Our generous donations will assist with this project and the good work of the Matumaini Centre.

Saint of the Week: Saint Frances of Rome Feast Day: March 9th



Frances' life combines aspects of secular and religious life. A devoted and loving wife, she longed for a lifestyle of prayer and service, so she organized a group of women to minister to the needs of Rome's poor.

Born of wealthy parents, Frances found herself attracted to the religious life during her youth. But her parents objected and a young nobleman was selected to be her husband. As she became acquainted with her new relatives, Frances soon discovered that the wife of her husband's brother also wished to live a life of service and prayer. So the two, Frances and Vannozza, set out together—with their husbands' blessings—to help the poor.

Frances fell ill for a time, but this apparently only deepened her commitment to the suffering people she met. The years passed, and Frances gave birth to two sons and a daughter. With the new responsibilities of family life, the young mother turned her attention more to the needs of her own household. The family flourished under Frances' care, but within a few years a great plague began to sweep across Italy. It struck Rome with devastating cruelty and left Frances' second son dead. In an effort to help alleviate some of the suffering, Frances used all her money and sold her possessions to buy whatever the sick might possibly need. When all the resources had been exhausted, Frances and Vannozza went door to door begging. Later, Frances' daughter died, and the saint opened a section of her house as a hospital.

Frances became more and more convinced that this way of life was so necessary for the world, and it was not long before she requested and was given permission to found a society of women bound by no vows. They simply offered themselves to God and to the service of the poor. Once the society was established, Frances chose not to live at the community residence, but rather at home with her husband. She did this for seven years, until her husband passed away, and then came to live the remainder of her life with the society—serving the poorest of the poor.

The life of Frances of Rome calls each of us not only to look deeply for God in prayer, but also to carry our devotion to Jesus living in the suffering of our world. Frances shows us that this life need not be restricted to those bound by vows.

In those days, God delivered all these commandments: "I, the LORD, am your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, that place of slavery. You shall not have other gods besides me. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. You shall not covet your neighbor's house. You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, nor his male or female slave, nor his ox or ass, nor anything else that belongs to him."

† A reading from the holy Gospel according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and oxen, and spilled the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables, and to those who sold doves he said, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." His disciples recalled the words of Scripture, Zeal for your house will consume me. At this the Jews answered and said to him. "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking about the temple of his body. Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken.

While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing. But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well.

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

Revelation:

"Revelation" is a tricky word. It contains the Latin root that means "to veil or cover" something, as well as the modifier that changes the meaning to its opposite. Something veiled is tantalizing. We cannot quite ignore it. We are curious, interested, intrigued, caught. We want to know, because we want closure. We don't want to know, because we like the mystery or because in knowing we might end up having to make a decision that might mean that there will be no going back.

Comment:

If we could gather all the knowledge and experience in the world, we might come to some glimpse or insight about the ways of God. But we would still be guessing. Personal revelation of the divine is a gift. In the Exodus and forging of a covenant, God is apprehended as one who acts on behalf of an enslaved people. God's deepest will for these people is that they respond to a covenant. The covenant is offered by God to a beloved and bewildered people on a desert mountain. Who would have thought it? Dreamed it? "I, the LORD, am your God who brought you out of ... that place of slavery." God the deliverer. God the covenant-maker. That is the exposed and veiled truth.

It took a long time for an enslaved people to understand that the commandments established the features of a relationship of God to a people and each person to the other. This newly freed people would know that they should keep God firmly in first place and reverently in mind and word. They should take a day a week off! Slaves should rest in the Lord! And then, they should care for one another and the good earth that encircles them. These ten commandments are avenues of expression, ways to let love show, ways to keep the covenant.

Thus we come to Jesus, whose behavior in this Gospel reading is somewhat surprising. Unlike the synoptic accounts of the cleansing of the Temple, which are set at the end of Jesus' public life, John sets Jesus' action near the beginning of his Gospel. Jesus' dramatic cleansing of the Temple occurs long before we are aware of any animosity from the official teachers of Israel. John is not so much concerned about auditing the Temple treasury as declaring clearly who Jesus is—the dwelling of God among us.

Today's Gospel action echoes the words that open John's Gospel: "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us" (1:14). The Temple in all its glory is not the dwelling that ultimately and finally counts here. Six and forty years abuilding, the Temple was still no more than a building set aside for holy purposes. John wants us to make no mistake: Jesus is the new dwelling of God, who will not be destroyed and who will be raised up in three days.

Reflection:

We are told that the "cleansing of the Temple" happened during the Passover festival, when Jesus was in Jerusalem with thousands of others who flocked there to recall the original Exodus and covenant. During that time, many came to believe in Jesus, but many also didn't. Jesus' anger in this story is aimed at those cynical leaders whose self-righteousness demands a clear, unambiguous sign tailor-made to oppose their comfortable expectations. Jesus is not the revelation they wanted.

There was not a way in the world that Jesus could reveal anything about himself or about God to these people in the usual way. For when the heart is closed and cynicism reigns, all signs are scorned and all bets are off. It did not matter what Jesus did in the Temple or what he said; a predisposition against Jesus would inevitably lead to a misreading of him. Even in our own time, the message of Jesus Christ is a challenge to the status quo.

Anointing of the Sick

\ə-'nòint-tiŋ 'əv 'thə 'sik∖

A sacrament for the recovery and salvation of a critically ill or injured person formerly called Extreme Unction ("last **anointing**"). No longer reserved for those near death, one may be **anointed** before surgery, in extreme age or illness, after losing consciousness, or when no longer coherent.

By the grace of the sacrament of **Anointing of the Sick**, the sick person receives the strength and the gift of uniting more closely to Christ's Passion.

WHY IT MATTERS

The mercy of God extends to the body as well as soul of each person. Jesus ministered to the sick and suffering both physically and spiritually. The church continues this ministry in its care for the whole person.

From Rites of the Catholic Church as revised by Decree of the Second Vatican Ecumenical Council: The Church obeys Jesus' command to care for the sick by visiting those in poor health but also by raising them up through the **sacrament of Anointing** and by nourishing them with the Eucharist during their illness. The church offers prayers for the sick to commend them to God, especially in the last crisis of life.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What is the Anointing of the Sick?

One of the seven sacraments of the church, **Anointing of the Sick** recalls the healing presence and power of Jesus when we touch our mortality most vulnerably. From ancient times oil was valued for its healing and beautifying properties and in preparing bodies for burial.

The ordinary minister of the sacrament is the priest. However, it's presumed that others share the event: family, friends, caregivers. Elements of the ritual include prayers, scripture, laying hands on the recipient, and **anointing** of the head and hands. A water sprinkling rite may be included, and affected areas of the sick person's body may also be **anointed**. When in danger of death, additional sacraments of Reconciliation and Communion (*viaticum*, or "on the way with you") are also administered.
