

At present, our parish uses two distinct online giving companies. These were both used before the merging of the parishes into the new Transfiguration Parish. The new website company has an online component which ties directly into our parish census allowing for more streamlined financial recording and tracking. There are many threads that need to be woven together before this process is up and running.

<u>Lenten Charity</u>: Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa

As announced at the beginning of Lent, our common, parish charity for Lent will be the ministries of the Holy Union Sisters in Tanzania, Africa. The people of North Attleborough have had a connection with the Holy Union since the Sisters first arrived 100 years ago to staff the new Sacred Heart School. That relationship continues in the person of Sister Kathee, our pastoral associate. Kathee also serves on the two person Leadership Team for the United States area of Holy Union and has met the Sisters who serve in Tanzania and can attest to both the great need for financial support and assistance and the exciting potential for growth and development in this African nation.

The Tanzanian area of the Holy Union congregation was founded in 1973, when two Sisters from the Anglo-Hibernian Province arrived to do education work. The number of Sisters and the works they are conducting have increased significantly over these fifty years. Our financial sacrifices/gifts will be used specifically for three projects the Sisters have designated during this their Jubilee year: an Autism Unit at the Matumaini Center the Sisters conduct for children with physical disabilities; a Novitiate House for the growing number of young women who are seeking to become Holy Union Sisters. At present there are 16 native Tanzanians in formation; and a Health Centre in the village of Churwi, adjacent to a primary school (2,000 pupils) the Sisters conduct.

White envelopes marked, "Lenten Collection 2024," may be found at the doors of each of our church buildings. You are invited to use this envelope when making your Lenten sacrifice donation for the good works of the Sisters in Tanzania. Envelopes may be dropped in the collection basket at weekend Mass, dropped at the parish office, or sent through the mail. If you are writing a check, please make the check out to Transfiguration of the Lord Parish. When all the funds are collected, the parish will write one single check to the Holy Union Sisters.

Many, many thanks for your consideration and participation in this parish Lenten project. By supporting the ministries and formation of the Sisters in Tanzania, we are remembering that we belong to a global Church – A Church that is MUCH larger than North Attleborough. In this international Faith community, we support each other with our prayer and our resources. We are so blessed here in North Attleborough. Let us share our blessings – generously – with this growing, enthusiastic, and energetic region of our Church!

The Gospel readings during the Octave include some of the most beautiful passages of scripture from the time after Jesus' Resurrection and his first encounters with his friends and disciples. These readings remind us of the importance of Jesus' Resurrection and the power of living out his message here on earth. Jesus appeared to his friends and disciples so that they might continue to share the Good News in word and deed with everyone they meet. We reflect on these readings every Easter Octave to strengthen our own faith and to connect with stories of Resurrection and hope that can inspire how we live our lives and practice our faith every day.

The Easter Prayer: Regina Caeli



The Easter season is fifty days – from Easter Sunday to Pentecost Sunday. During this season, we swap out one of the Church's traditional prayers for another.

While Catholics pray the Angelus for the vast majority of the year, during Easter we pray the Regina Caeli. The Angelus prayer dates back to the Middle Ages and commemorates the Incarnation of Christ in the womb of the Virgin Mary, and is usually prayed at 6am, noon, and 6pm. Regina Caeli is Latin for "Queen of Heaven". This prayer dates back to the 12th or 13th century and its author is unknown. It is a tribute to our Blessed Mother and an exclamation of joy at the Resurrection of our Lord.

While the Angelus remembers the Angel Gabriel's message to Mary and her Fiat to God's plan for salvation, the Regina Caeli celebrates that 'yes' through which the Redeemer entered the world and subsequently rose from the dead. After the immense sorrow of the Mother of God at witnessing the suffering and death of her Son, this prayer acknowledges her joy at His rising from the dead. From now through Pentecost, pray the Regina Caeli!


A reading from the Acts of the Apostles



On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

EASTER SUNDAY

The Day of the Lord:

The antiphon from today's responsorial psalm proclaims, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad." This, indeed, is a brand new day, the first of days. This day unlocks the meaning of all our days. Sin is banished, death conquered, and life opens onto life. The day celebrates new creation. This day, the tree of destruction has become the tree of life, whose first blossom is Christ, whose fragrance gives life, and whose blooming sets us all free.

Comment:

Although the reading from the Acts of the Apostles serves as a powerful recapitulation of Jesus' ministry, its final verse also provides a definition of the meaning of the resurrection. Namely, Peter and the other apostles found the Resurrection to be an experience of forgiveness and reconciliation. Peter and the other followers of Jesus—all but a few of whom had abandoned Jesus in his final hours—experienced the Resurrection as healing, reconciliation, and wholeness restored. Peter, then, urges his listeners to faith so that they might also experience resurrection in their lives.

The passage from Paul's letter to the Colossians reminds us to delight in the fullness and newness of life that abides within us. Fear and alienation should be things of the past. Anxiety, dread, and apprehension should no longer afflict or concern us. Glory is ours, the same glory that is Christ's. Nothing should inhibit us from unfettered joy. Since we are resurrection people, we must recognize that the risen Christ is present in the nitty-gritty of life and choose to act and live now as people who truly have died and risen to new life. The resurrection of Jesus is God's way of restoring our humanity to us. Perhaps that is why the Gospel is far more concerned with what happens to Jesus' followers than it is in detailing what happened to Jesus. The good news of the Resurrection is much more than a happy ending to a violent tale. It is the beginning of a whole new way of life and living—our living and our lives. Like the disciples in the Gospel, all we need do to share in this life is to believe.

Reflection:

Interestingly, Jesus himself does not appear in these Easter readings. The witnesses do. We read their stories. They are transformed in the news of his resurrection. We know how thoroughly transformed they were by reading the accounts from Acts and from the letters of Paul. For today's second reading, the Church offers us the option of two readings, one from Paul's first letter to Corinth; the other, his letter to Colossae. Both affirm the reality and power of the Resurrection. Both call for action. Faith in the resurrection means acting as people risen with their risen Lord. In the letter to the Colossians. Paul reminds us that we who have risen with him have also died with him. For baptized Christians, the old unredeemed world holds no sway, has no validity, is not worth our time and attention. The first letter to the Corinthians says this in another way. The old, worn way is like old yeast in the dough. Life in Christ is new, all new. Though Jesus Christ does not appear as risen Lord in these readings, he is where the witnesses are. They who were once followers do not walk with him side by side or a little behind him. They live in him. They have passed from death to life in his death and resurrection. They are called to live as a new people. So are we.

WHY IT MATTERS

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Why is Easter Season so long?

The Easter Season is determined by the eight weeks it takes to get from the Resurrection to Pentecost. In Lent, we embrace penitential practices in anticipation of Jesus' Resurrection. What happens next is nothing less than the birth of the church. Easter itself is an **octave**, or eight-day feast. In liturgical practice, the **Octave** of Easter is like a week of Easters as we light the Paschal candle, sing the Gloria, and continue to contemplate the wonder that death has a door. Jesus passed through it, and so will we. Is a week too long to ponder this?

After Easter, Jesus continues to appear, teaching them more about God's kingdom for 40 days, a sacred number symbolizing completeness. Then Jesus returns to his Father in the Ascension. The disciples devote themselves to prayer from that hour until Pentecost, when the Spirit comes and the church is launched into prime time. What should we be doing from Easter through Pentecost? Imitating the disciples: celebrating, contemplating, learning, and praying to prepare for the mission ahead.
