

Forty days after Easter, May 9, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, a holyday of obligation. In our parish, there will be three opportunities to participate at Mass for this holy day:

Holyday Mass: Thursday, May 9, 9:30 a.m. Sacred Heart Church

Holyday Mass: Thursday, May 9, 12:05 p.m. Saint Mary Church

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Over the next few weeks, the Town of North Attleborough will be reconfiguring the area on Park Street/North Washington Street in front of Saint Mary Church. Hopefully, this new design will provide a much safer and more efficient traffic flow.

You have most probably noticed the addition of a sidewalk following north on the west side of North Washington Street, along the Baptist Common. This will continue to the new entrance/exit onto/from Park Street from/to North Washington Street. In addition to new sidewalks on both Park Street and Tifft Street, there will be a new "driveway area" in front of Saint Mary Church (behind the new lawn and sidewalk) This is primarily for use at funerals and weddings, but we may also use this area for parishioner parking at weekend Masses and parish functions. You will note that this area will not be a roadway. A new flashing crosswalk light will be placed at the Tifft Street/Park Street corner. New crosswalks will also be painted across Tifft Street, Park Street, and North Washington Street. Please be aware that the speed limit will be lowered in this section of Park Street and North Washington Street.

Mark Hollowell, director of the Department of Public Works for the Town of North Attleborough, has been most generous in keeping us appraised of the Town's plans and sharing this information. Mark has been a big help and we very much appreciate his reaching out and including us "in the loop." I am confident that these improvements will greatly add to both the aesthetics of this historic area as well as the safety of our parishioners and fellow citizens.

I do have one request: Please BE PATIENT during this construction. Yes, it may be a little disruptive, but just think of the beautiful and safe outcome! I'm certain that we will need some time to get used to the new design, so patience will be key. Thank you for your cooperation and assistance.

Saint of the Week: Saint Damien of Molokai

The man who would become St. Damien of Molokai, was born in rural Belgium, on January 3, 1840. His name was Jozef De Veuster, and he was the youngest of seven children. Growing up on the farm, Jozef was prepared to take over for his family, but he did not want the responsibility. Instead, he wanted to follow his older brother and two sisters who took religious vows. Jozef attended school until the age of 13 when his help was needed on the family farm full-time. He aided his family until he was old enough to enter the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary. He took the name Damien, after a sixth century martyr. In 1864, Damien's brother who was also in the same order of religious, was ordered to Hawaii. But his brother became ill, so Br. Damien offered to go in his place.

The brothers worried that Br. Damien was too uneducated to become a priest, although he was not considered unintelligent. Br. Damien demonstrated his ability by quickly learning Latin from his brother. Br. Damien prayed each day before an icon of Saint Francis Xavier to be sent on a mission. Eventually, his religious brothers agreed to send him and have him ordained. Br. Damien arrived in Hawaii in March 1864, and was ordained as a priest on the island of Hawaii two months later. For nine years, he worked on the island as a priest, leading an important, yet undistinguished life.


In 1866, Hawaii established a leper colony on the Kalaupapa Peninsula. It was still mistakenly believed that leprosy was highly contagious. This belief resulted in the forced quarantine of leprosy patients. These people still needed spiritual and medical care, so to Fr. Damien discerned his call to serve them. In 1873, Fr. Damien made the trip to be with these people in their colony.

Upon arrival, he found the colony was poorly maintained. Anarchy reigned among the people living there. Many patients required treatment but had nobody to care for them. Other patients took to drinking and became severe alcoholics. Every kind of immorality and misbehavior was on display in the lawless colony. There was no law or order. Fr. Damien realized the people needed leadership, so he provided it. He asked people to come together to build houses and schools and eventually the parish church, St. Philomena. The church still stands today. The sick were cared for and the dead buried. Order and routine made the colony livable. Fr. Damien personally provided much of the care the people needed.

Fr. Damien contracted leprosy in 1885, after several years of work. He realized he had the disease when he placed his foot into scalding water by accident, but felt no pain. This was a common way by which people discovered they were infected. Leprosy attacks nerve endings and a victim may hurt themselves but not feel any pain. Fr. Damien continued his work, despite his illness, which slowly took over his body. He derived strength from prayer and devotion. He often went to the cemetery to pray the Rosary or spent time in the presence of the Eucharist. "It is at the foot of the altar that we find the strength we need in our isolation," he wrote.

After sixteen years in the colony, Fr. Damien succumbed to leprosy on April 15, 1889. He was first buried nearby, then his remains were transferred to Belgium in 1936. His right hand was returned to Hawaii in 1995 to be reburied in his original grave at Molokai. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II in Brussels, Belgium on June 4, 1995. His sainthood was confirmed on October 11, 2009 by Pope Benedict XVI. His feast day is May 10.

Feast Day of St. Damien of Molokai: May 10th







SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Love:

Christians talk about love a lot. In English, this little word is forced to do the heavy lifting. It has to stand for everything from the overly sweet Valentine's day hearts to the nuanced love that lasts a lifetime. If love were all fluff and sugar, we could get along with a book of sentimental sayings. But love is strong and demanding, and for this kind of love, we need a book of Gospels.

Comment:

Just prior to today's selection from the Acts of the Apostles, we meet Cornelius the Roman centurion, a devout, upright, and God-fearing man who is much loved and respected by the Jews. Cornelius inquires after Peter, and Peter goes to his home.

The reading opens today with Peter coming to Cornelius' home and being greeted with a kind of respect that unnerves Peter. And there is yet more to this surprising visit: Cornelius in his seemingly simple request unwittingly forces a decision. What is Peter to do about this good and loving Gentile who seeks baptism? What is to become of the small but growing band of those who follow Jesus?

Peter asks himself what he can possibly do with a people who have already been blessed by the Holy Spirit. His actions seem right: Peter baptizes Cornelius and his household and remains with them a few days. This story tells of the first welcome of a Gentile into what would become a universal Church, open to all. Cornelius' request and Peter's response set the Church on a course that makes it truly universal. The Spirit leaps over the boundaries of old rites and cherished memories of a chosen yet circumscribed people. The promised Spirit makes it known that the whole world is now chosen.

The Gospel also reminds us who is choosing and who is chosen. In Israel's experience, would-be disciples gathered to listen to various rabbis. Through this protracted process, disciples eventually chose the rabbi they wished to follow. Jesus reverses the process. In his case, he, the rabbi or teacher, chooses the disciples, just as the Father has chosen Jesus. Throughout their public ministry together, Jesus has taught them all he knows, and now during this Last Supper discourse, he invites them into a deeper intimacy. Their relationship to him is not just that of a master to servant, but one of friend to friend.

Jesus is clearly intense in his insistence that they love one another and live on in his love. He does not merely suggest this nor simply urge the disciples to do so, he commands it. The word "love" here is translated from the Greek agape, which describes the mutual self-giving relationship between Jesus and God and must exist mutually between Jesus and his followers. The love that the Father bestowed on Christ is spread abroad. It gets up and works. It visits the house of the unlikely candidate, Cornelius.

Reflection:

Easy love doesn't require obedience and openness to its demands. It doesn't call for followup. It doesn't demand that we work to stay vulnerable. The Gospel, however, doesn't speak of easy love, which is really not love at all. The second reading tells us that the love demanded of us is possible because God has first loved us. When love is spoken of in the two readings attributed to John, we see how important it is to understand and appreciate that Jesus is the manifestation of God's abiding love. Through him, God's love is poured out. John calls us to recognize this and then to respond by loving one another. Our loving brings full circle the love of God manifest in Jesus.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

What is Christ's Ascension?

Ascension seems like a feast designed to resolve a mystery: after Easter, where did Jesus go? Answer: back to his Father. Yet Ascension stories don't exactly provide a snapshot of Jesus leaving town. Luke says Jesus was removed to heaven from Bethany on the day of his Resurrection. Acts of the Apostles reports this event 40 days later, from the Mount of Olives. Mark agrees that it happened on Easter—but while Jesus was at table with his disciples. Houston, we have a problem.

Or maybe not. Saint John Chrysostom insisted **Ascension** simply conveys the final exaltation of Christ after the humiliation of the cross. Saint Augustine viewed the **Ascension** as the glorification of us all: where Jesus went, we too might go. Theologians distinguish between "passive" assumptions and the active **Ascension** of Jesus. Another unique element of the **Ascension** is that while Jesus is physically gone, he remains present in a new way. The church becomes the visible Body of Christ on Earth, bearing his Spirit and sharing his Eucharist. In short, Jesus lifts up the church to where he is.
