

From Fr. Costa:

Last weekend, you may have heard Adam, our music director, refer to the Christmas Mass schedule in his post-Communion "plug" for new choir members. Yes, that schedule has been determined. To assist with your planning, I offer the schedule and some of the rationale behind this time schedule.



As Christmas falls on a Monday this year, we celebrate a very, very brief fourth week of preparation. The **Fourth Sunday of Advent** is Saturday, December 23, and Sunday, December 24. There will be **two** Masses scheduled for this last Sunday of Advent:

Saturday, December 23, Vigil Mass @ 4:00 p.m. St. Mary Church

Sunday, December 24, Morning Mass @ 9:30 a.m. St. Mary Church



There will be six (6) Masses celebrated for the **Christmas** holy day in our parish. Each of our churches will have two Masses. As the 4:00 p.m. Vigil Mass is the most popular with our parishioners, there will be three 4:00 p.m. celebrations. The solemn Mass for Christmas will be celebrated at 9:00 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church. The Roman Missal (the official prayerbook for Mass) no longer refers to this as Midnight Mass. Now it is called "Mass in the Night." This Mass will feature our choir and instrumentalists. There will be a concert of Christmas music before the Mass. The full schedule for Christmas Masses is as follows:

Saint of the Week: St. Frances Xavier Cabrini November 13th



St. Frances Cabrini, the first American citizen saint of the Church, is widely known for her energy, her generosity, and her vibrant love for those most in need. It's easy to admire her but (powerhouse that she was) sometimes a bit hard to imitate her! One way to grow to be like Mother Cabrini is to focus less on her accomplishments and more on three key aspects of faith she can teach us.

1. Mother Cabrini can teach us how to pray better. "*I* trust in you, my Jesus. I place my poor soul in your hands – mold me according to your divine will," she wrote in 1877.

2. Mother Cabrini can teach us how to accept difficulty. When we struggle with difficulties we wish would go away, Mother Cabrini's example can help. Acceptance makes every cross lighter for, as she said, "*If you carry the Cross willingly, the Cross will carry you.*"

3. Mother Cabrini can show us how to grow in humility. "A single act of humility is worth more than the proud exhibition of any virtue" she advised.


Glory to you, O Lord.

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Time:

Our use of time is revealing. We make instant coffee. We buy packages of one-minute food and add water or broth or milk. We are familiar with the adjective "quick." It describes shops and services. But, on the other hand, we take all the time we need when we are pursuing certain occupations or hobbies. We have all the time in the world to pursue the object of our affections.

Comment:

Our first reading is from Wisdom, the newest Old Testament book. It was written in Alexandria, Egypt somewhere between 50 and 30 B.C. Here he is, a Jewish scholar and philosopher speaking from the standpoint of his minority faith to a majority Greek culture. The author frames Wisdom as a personified attribute of God. The Wisdom that is the focus of concern for the seeker is readily available. The one who loves, seeks, watches for Wisdom, will find her ready to hand. Wisdom/God is not elusive, tricky, wily. Wisdom wants to be found; Wisdom is available. Wisdom opens to the seeker. She graciously appears; she all but goes out to meet the one who seeks.

This seeking, vigil keeping, attentiveness is also present in the Gospel for today. Matthew's Gospel was written between 80 and 90 (a relatively long time after Jesus' resurrection and ascension). The question of the end-times or the day of the Lord's coming loomed fairly large on the horizon for the early Church. The first followers of Jesus fully expected his imminent return.

This story of the wise and foolish virgins, found only in Matthew, responds to this concern. It seems to drive home the point that we must exercise foresight, because the time of the coming of the Lord is uncertain. There's just no telling.

The parable includes some details that are a little stretched to prove a point. The bridegroom is late in coming for his bride. This surely addresses the impatience of the members of the early Church. The virgins seem ungenerous, but no one can do the waiting for another. That is, no one can live another person's life for them. Each is responsible for his or her own attentive vigilance. This same lesson is retaught in the second of three parables that make up the twentyfifth chapter of Matthew's Gospel. The lesson of these parables apparently needs reinforcement!

Paul's letter to the Thessalonians also takes up the point of the Second Coming and responds to the question of the beloved faithful who died before the Second Coming. What of those who will not be around for this great and awesome day? In the end, Paul's words are sufficient for us also. They are based on trust in the power of the Resurrection. We can be sure—as they were—that the deceased and the living are always with the Lord. No faithful one is or ever will be forgotten.

Reflection:

All three readings for today nudge us toward an earthly practicality. Initially, this doesn't seem to be the case. The focus seems to be on the end of life, rather than the object of our present life. Seeking God is to be the focus, or object, of our life. The end of life will take care of itself. We can pretty much leave that alone, or leave it in God's hands. Daily life is the stuff we are called to manage and mold and handle. We seek Wisdom/God in all our doings and Wisdom will most certainly come to us. We live in the sure knowledge, won in the Resurrection, that we will not be left alone or left out like those who dallied or let all the oil drain away from their lamps.

We are called to tend our circle of light. This message is not nearly as spectacular as the recurring ominous predictions of end-times one runs across on television and radio programs. There seems no end of seers. Jesus insists that we just don't know the day or the hour, but there is no such humility among those prognosticators and fearmongers who want to grab our time and attention.

Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini was born Maria Francesca in Italy in 1850, the youngest of 13 children. She was small and had poor health. Because of her frailty, she was rejected by the religious community she wanted to join. She founded her own order and dreamed of becoming a missionary to the Far East like the saint whose name she took. But the pope sent her west instead, to the United States—and she founded 67 missionary institutions to serve the sick and poor from New York to Chicago to Los Angeles. Nine years after her death, her religious institute, the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, became missionaries in China. Don't underestimate the power of God or yourself!

Christian hope is not the naïve, even adolescent, optimism of those who hope that things may change [and] in the meantime go on with life; it has to do with building daily, by concrete gestures, the kingdom of love, justice, and fraternity that Jesus inaugurated." Or as Italian Bishop Don Tonio Bello would say, "We cannot be content to hope. We have to organize hope." How will you organize hope today?

Live a life of great service

The great Dominican friar Albertus Magnus died on this day in 1280, after a long life of dedication to the church as a scholar, scientist, and briefly the bishop of Regensburg. He shunned excess and was known as a mediator—which, in his day, was a complicated matter, given the ongoing Crusades. We, too, live in an age of war, economic inequality, and general spiritual laxity. We owe it to ourselves to look to the German Dominican for inspiration to live a more rigorous life of spiritual seeking, so as to find lasting solutions to the problems of our day.

But lacemakers and other artisan workers also often sat on the edge of poverty. These were the people who benefitted from the kind deeds of the likes of Saint Elizabeth, who roamed the streets near her castle passing out alms for the poor and tending to the sick. She insisted that slaves in the household be treated well, arguing, "They have the same soul as we; they have been redeemed by the same blood and received into the same Church," but, like all of us, she was clearly enmeshed in social structures in need of redemption. Work for a society that truly is free at last.
