

From Fr. Costa:

You may have heard Adam, our music director, refer to the Christmas Mass schedule in his "plug" for new choir members. Yes, that schedule has been determined. To assist with your planning, I offer the schedule and some of the rationale behind this time schedule.



As Christmas falls on a Monday this year, we celebrate a very, very brief fourth week of preparation. The Fourth Sunday of Advent is Saturday, December 23, and Sunday, December 24. There will be two Masses scheduled for this last Sunday of Advent:

Saturday, December 23, Vigil Mass @ 4:00 p.m. St. Mary Church

Sunday, December 24, Morning Mass @ 9:30 a.m. St. Mary Church



There will be six (6) Masses celebrated for the **Christmas** holy day in our parish. Each of our churches will have two Masses. As the 4:00 p.m. Vigil Mass is the most popular with our parishioners, there will be three 4:00 p.m. celebrations. The solemn Mass for Christmas will be celebrated at 9:00 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church. The Roman Missal (the official praverbook for Mass) no longer refers to this as Midnight Mass. Now it is called "Mass in the Night." This Mass will feature our choir and instrumentalists. There will be a concert of Christmas music before the Mass. 

Saint of the Week: Blessed Miguel Agustín Pro November 23rd



"Viva Cristo Rey!"—Long live Christ the King!—were the last words Pro uttered before he was executed for being a Catholic priest and serving his flock.

Born into a prosperous, devout family in Guadalupe de Zacatecas, Mexico, Miguel entered the Jesuits in 1911, but three years later fled to Granada, Spain, because of religious persecution in Mexico. He was ordained in Belgium in 1925. Father Pro immediately returned to Mexico, where he served a Church forced to go "underground." He celebrated the Eucharist clandestinely and ministered the other sacraments to small groups of Catholics.

He and his brother Roberto were arrested on trumpedup charges of attempting to assassinate Mexico's president. Roberto was spared, but Miguel was sentenced to face a firing squad on November 23, 1927. His funeral became a public demonstration of faith. Miguel Pro was beatified in 1988.

When Fr. Miguel Pro was executed in 1927, no one could have predicted that 52 years later a Pope would visit Mexico, be welcomed by its president, and celebrate open-air Masses before thousands of people. Pope John Paul II made additional trips to Mexico in 1990, 1993, 1999, and 2002. Those who outlawed the Catholic Church in Mexico did not count on the deeply rooted faith of its people, and the willingness of many of them, like Miguel Pro, to die as martyrs. "Viva Cristo Rey!"

For to everyone who has, more will be given and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away. And throw this useless servant into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.""

THIRTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

At Our Best:

We often hear the terms "on message" and "on task" these days. This is another way of talking about focus. Strong leaders urge us toward objectives deemed worthy of our time and effort. They marshal our energy toward those great, good objectives. People of vision so engaged, do their best work. Everything else is subordinated to the great work. In times like these, we are at our best.

Comment:

Our first reading from the book of Proverbs describes one person at her best—the valiant woman, the strong wife and homemaker. This image is of a person who does her work successfully and is a boon to her family, her nation. This opening reading is not meant to proffer advice to mothers and wives everywhere. It is, rather, a portrait of a person who is good at what she does. She knows her vocation and goes about it with love and attention and skill.

And so it is for two of the servants in the Gospel parable set before us today. Again, we hear Jesus address the disciples on the question of the final coming of the reign of God and the value of our daily life with this great expectation looming, but not coming any time soon.

To the parable of the wise and foolish virgins (the Gospel of last Sunday), Jesus adds the parable we read today. We have heard this story many times before, for it is told in the other Gospels and is easily remembered. Each servant is given a share of responsibility commensurate with his skills. The task is set forth for the servants. The coins are not gifts, they are responsibilities. There are strings attached. They have something to do and the wit to do it. The master does not ask the impossible. He also does not tell the servants when he'll be back. What to do? Spend? Invest? Hoard? At least, no one spends the silver coins on junk. Two invest the silver coins and one hoards them. The investors are commended for their behavior; the hoarder is condemned for his.

Reflection:

Now, why don't we just consider this as a good old protracted proverb that can be used for one of those get-rich seminars we read about in the newspapers? Because the silver pieces of this parable stand for the Christian's responsibility as a citizen of heaven and of this world. The two responsibilities are one. We are to be engaged in this world of people—the ones on buses and sidewalks and in skyscrapers as well as those on small main streets and in country stores and at home. Let us remember the question facing the early community, for it is the question that we must face: How do we wait, and how do we go on? Is this a paradox?

Paul simply tells us in the second reading that we don't know when the reign of God will come, nor should we be overly worried about it. His image of the thief in the night focuses on the unexpected. To be always wary is impossible. We'll end up on edge; eventually we will let down our guard. Paul reminds us that we live in the daylight of the Resurrection. We are called to the open, fearless engagement of the wise investors and the valiant woman of the first reading. We are not to cringe fearfully in the dark as one who fails to realize his or her own ability and responsibility, as one who buries everything in a dark hole.

Curl up with the Good Book

President Franklin D. Roosevelt inaugurated the first National Bible Week. Presidents since have continued the tradition of encouraging scripture reading during the holidays. The practice began in 1941, when NBC radio hosted the National Bible Association's founders. News of the attack on Pearl Harbor interrupted the program, and NBC asked the association to continue reading the Bible all day to a grieving nation. This week, spend some time with scripture daily. Consider reading the book of your choice, from the Old or New Testaments. Or read a psalm of thanksgiving daily. Discover the inspiration.

Can we talk?

The word *bible* is from a Greek word meaning "book." If you could have no other book, the Bible would be the one! As you count your blessings this week, don't forget to give thanks for sacred scripture and spend some time with the inspired word of God. If you haven't before, try *lectio divina* (Latin for "divine reading")—it's a traditional monastic form of praying with scripture in a meditative way to open ourselves to hearing what God is saying to us and listening for our own interior response. Scripture isn't just text, it's the Living Word—strike up a conversation!

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 1:10-15, 41-43, 54-57, 62-63; Luke 18:35-43 (497). "What do you want me to do for you?"

Mary, most exemplary

According to tradition, Mary's parents—an elderly Anne and Joachim—were so grateful for the unexpected birth of their daughter, they presented her in the Temple to thank God. Accounts also say the toddler Mary "danced with joy" on the third step of the Temple, signifying her future role. Other qualities of the Blessed Mother, present even from her youth, are enumerated in the "Ten Evangelical Virtues of Mary" that we're all encouraged to emulate as Christians: pure, prudent, humble, faithful, devout, obedient, poor, patient, merciful, and sorrowful. Cultivate these in your own life by praying the Virtues of Mary chaplet used by the Marian religious order since 1699.

Bruckner's Te Deum as performed by the talented musicians of the Accademia Nazionale di Santa Cecilia (National Academy of St. Cecilia, founded under Pope Sixtus V in 1585) or check out the contemporary namesake band La Santa Cecilia, recipient of the 2013 Grammy for Best Latin Rock Album (Alternative or Urban).

Give thanks for a virtuous day

Because Thanksgiving brings together family members, personalities sometimes grate, children might misbehave, and the gravy surely will spill. It's an ideal day to practice what the Catechism of the Catholic Church calls the "cardinal virtues": prudence (think before you act), justice (be fair), fortitude (don't give up), and temperance (maintain your equilibrium). These virtues smooth out the bumps in human interaction. Ask God to increase in you the virtue you most need for a happy celebration today.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 2:15-29; Luke 19:41-44 (500). Mass for Thanksgiving Day (943-947). "If this day you only knew what makes for peace."

Follow the rule

"Keep the rule, and the rule will keep you." In this monastic proverb, "rule" refers to the daily rhythm of life for monks and nuns that is grounded in their foundation and charism as a community and oriented toward Jesus the Christ. The rule helps the community develop habits for prayer, work, relationships, study, and even play. Monastics still follow a rule of life, as do other intentional communities. Each of us can develop a rule of life according to our own daily rhythm and relationship with God. This rule will keep us grounded, even when the inevitable storms of life roll in.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Maccabees 4:36-37, 52-59; Luke 19:45-48 (501). "Let us go up to purify the sanctuary and rededicate it."

No room for violence

On this day in 1960 a trio of courageous sisters was brutally assassinated for opposing the murderous regime of Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo. Since 1993, the U.N. has commemorated World Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women in honor of the Mirabal sisters. It is an appropriate coincidence that today we also honor Catherine of Alexandria, a young convert martyred at the tender age of 18 during Roman persecutions around the year 300. She was reportedly subject to terrible tortures, but her courage instead attracted hundreds more converts. No woman should have to endure violence for any reason. Today is a day we can honor martyrs both modern and ancient with a firm "No más, no more."
