



October is Respect Life Month

We expect to pay more for something that will last a long time - things that are durable. We value rare or unique things. Works of great beauty can be extremely expensive.

Yet, our society seems to place little value on the one thing that is truly priceless - human life itself. If we compare human life to things that we prize, by every measure, human life comes out on top. Think about it:

Durability: human beings last forever. Everything on earth will pass away; the earth itself will pass away. But God offers each of us *eternal* life.

Uniqueness: every human person is unique, unrepeatable and irreplaceable. Even identical twins have different fingerprints, facial expressions, personalities. Never in the history of the world has there been another you, nor will there ever be.

Beauty: is there anything more beautiful, anything you'd rather look at a dozen times a day, than the face of a loved one?

From the moment of conception, the awesome complexity of a new human life unfolds. Parents provide the 46 chromosomes, but God supplies the human soul to create the person known and loved from all eternity. Even before birth, human life is miraculous, the differentiation of cells, the development of organs with highly specialized functions, the maturing of the brain, the memory and the five senses. Every human being shares the same origin, nature and destiny, but our features and physique, skills, interests, tastes and habits are astonishingly diverse.

What is most miraculous about human life is why we exist at all. God created every human person in his image and likeness. You, me, one-celled human embryos in lab dishes, unborn children and their impoverished parents living in the slums of less-developed nations, people who struggle with disabilities, comatose or dying patients, convicted killers on death row. Each and every one possesses inherent God-given dignity equal to that of every other human.

As individuals and as a faith community, we can change the face of our world to reflect the value and dignity of every human life. Life is a gift, ours to take care of - not to throw away and never to take from another. God calls each one of us to safeguard our own life and the lives of those in need of assistance, attention, prayer.

Surely, we can do no less than heed his call.

Transfiguration of the Lord Parish Women's Guild: Gift Certificate Calendar



Saint of the Week: Mother Theodore Guerin October 3rd

Trust in God's Providence enabled Mother Theodore to leave her homeland, sail halfway around the world, and found a new religious congregation.


Born in Etables, France, Anne-Thérèse Guérin's life was shattered by her father's murder when she was 15. For several years she cared for her mother and younger sister. She entered the Sisters of Providence in 1823, taking the name Sister Saint Theodore. An illness during novitiate left her with lifelong fragile health, but that did not keep her from becoming an accomplished teacher.

At the invitation of the bishop of Vincennes, Indiana, Sr. Saint Theodore and five sisters were sent to Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Indiana, in 1840, to teach and to care for the sick poor. She was to establish a motherhouse and novitiate. Only later did she learn that her French superiors had already decided the sisters in the United States should form a new religious congregation under her leadership.

Mother Theodore and her community persevered despite fires, crop failures, prejudice against Catholic women religious, misunderstandings, and separation from their original religious congregation. She once told her sisters, "Have confidence in the Providence that so far has never failed us. The way is not yet clear. Grope along slowly. Do not press matters; be patient, be trustful." Another time she asked, "With Jesus, what shall we have to fear?"

God's work gets done by people ready to take risks and to work hard—always remembering what Saint Paul told the Corinthians, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God caused the growth." Every holy person has a strong sense of God's Providence.

Mother Theodore was buried in the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in what is now the Shrine of St. Mother Theodore, in Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Indiana. She was beatified in 1998, and canonized as Saint Theodora Guérin eight years later, one of the newest saints of the Catholic Church in the United States. Her congregation, The Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary of the Woods, continue her work across our country. For many years the Sisters staffed schools in the Boston area and in New Hampshire. The provincial house for the eastern part of the congregation was located in the city of Fall River.

Seamless unity

We work best when we work together. A society pulling in opposite directions tears itself apart. The final prayer Jesus offers at the Last Supper is for unity among his friends. Saint Paul likewise implores his communities to be of one heart. Today, on Respect Life Sunday, we soberly confess that we can't both honor the sacred gift of life and allow poverty, injustice, exclusion, and indifference to remain unchallenged. Coincidentally, it's the International Day of Older Persons, in a world where people over 60 outnumber children under 5. Make this world a welcome place for everyone.

What exactly does the church teach about angels? "The existence of the spiritual, non-corporeal beings that Sacred Scripture usually calls 'angels' is a truth of faith," says the Catechism of the Catholic Church. The church venerates angels as servants and messengers of God. And one is particularly looking out for you. But, as Pope Francis says, not just to protect but to prod: "The angels help us; they push us to continue on the journey [of life]." These pure spirits who are in communication with God encourage us to "be not afraid" and take risks. Join the church in welcoming these—and your—special guardians.

The Lord loves justice

Mother Theodore Guerin, whose feast is today, was a missionary to the United States who established schools, a pharmacy, and orphanages. But her love of Christ made her denounce injustices, too. She described a slave auction: "These Americans, so proud of their liberty, thus make game of the liberty of others. Poor negroes! I would have wished to buy them all that I might say to them, 'Go! Bless Providence. You are free!" Her mission continues today with her Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, who strive for peace and justice, particularly in the area of racial equality and equity, criminal justice reform, human trafficking, and immigration. Take to heart Mother Guerin's words as you work to transform the world: "Above all things; justice, justice. If any preference may be shown let it be to the poorest or most abandoned."

TODAY'S READINGS: Zechariah 8:20-23; Luke 9:51-56 (456). "Every nationality, speaking different tongues, shall . . . say, 'Let us go with you, for we have heard that God is with you."

Make mercy your song to all creation

The feast of Saint Francis of Assisi is a great date to reflect on one's care for creation, as we are often wont to think all that matters in the spiritual life is our connection to God and other humans. The great Franciscan founder showed us by his life, including preaching to the creatures of the air and the field, that all of creation is listening to hear what we have to say. Is our

message that of compassion and prudence, or rather convenience and the "throwaway culture"? Perhaps God himself is choosing to lend an ear by means of all God's creatures, great and small.

Mercy prevails

Saint Faustina Kowalska is one of a long list of saints who held low status but whose intense relationship with God fueled a power that gained attention. A peasant who became a nun assigned low-level jobs, Faustina's mystical visions of Jesus—at first doubted by church authorities—eventually were embraced widely. They are the foundation of Divine Mercy Sunday, characterized by an image of Jesus with rays of mercy emanating from his heart. Faustina's focus on God's mercy is a message that helped her native Poland through harrowing years of war and repressive government, and it continues to inspire. Commit yourself to an act of mercy today.

The stories of the founders of religious institutes most often begin with reluctant souls who feel unworthy to accept such an important task. But, luckily for the church and all blessed by their service and legacy, they eventually take up the mantle of leadership. The decision is not without its benefits, according to Saint Bruno, founder of the Carthusians: "God gives his athletes the reward they desire: a peace that the world does not know and joy in the Holy Spirit." And, for Blessed Marie Rose Durocher, founder of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, prayer is key to finding the answers you seek when unsure of next steps: "I suggest that you pray to Our Lord that He assist you and give you the direction you need." 

TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Freedom of Choice:

Miss Havisham in Dickens' Great Expectations could not change the past, so she made the choice to live in it. She sat at a long banquet table covered with cobwebs, nibbling mice, and rotted food, waiting for her husband-to-be. She wore a yellowed wedding dress as tarnished and torn as her view of life. While she held desperately to the past, the present was not negotiable. Living in the past with regrets and mistakes causes us to despair and lose hope. All the readings today encourage us to change from the harmful ways of the past and live in good emotional and spiritual health during the present.

FIRST READING: Ezekiel 18:25–28 RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 25:4–5, 6–7, 8–9 SECOND READING: Philippians 2:1–11 [1–5] GOSPEL: Matthew 21:28–32

Comment:

During the Babylonian exile, the prophet Ezekiel told God's people that they were responsible for their own actions. They did not accept their responsibility for their own behavior and blamed their separation from God on their ancestors. They made excuses for their behavior and blamed their problems on the sinfulness of the generations before them. Ezekiel challenged them to get in the present and take responsibility for their own actions, to do what they knew was right regardless of past events.

Paul's message to the Philippians also encouraged them to live obediently in the present. For the Philippians, they had the advantage of having Jesus as an example. They saw how fullness came to Jesus because he was humble and obedient before God. Jesus gave us the example of living God's law of love—to love one another more than ourselves.

Matthew asked the question about who would inherit the promises of God. Last week we discovered that we would inherit the Kingdom because of God's generosity. This week, the parable shows us how we will live with God because of choices we make and actions we take. When a father wanted his two sons to work in the field, one said "no," but later changed his mind and went to the field to work. The other son said he would go, but never did. The parable shows us how God calls us to change our lives from saying "no" to saying "yes" by our actions of repentance. It is far worse to be like the son who said "yes" but did nothing. To act this way would be like telling people that we are Christian and love God but not having our actions fit our words.

Reflection:

God gives us free will to choose. We can choose to say "yes," or we can choose to say "no." The most saintly among us will say "yes" right away and go to work in the field at once. Others of us say "no," but change our minds and hearts and try to live God's command to love one another. Still others of us say "yes" but do nothing. We are lazy, stubborn, or have a well-worked list of excuses for not showing our love.

By giving us free will, God shows us unconditional love. We are responsible for ourselves and our own actions, but with unconditional love God embraces us and our mistakes with mercy and pardon.

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
