

From Fr. Costa:

A few weeks ago, when we announced the return to our three worship sites and the Fall Mass schedule, I failed to give a fuller explanation behind the decision. My apologies!

As you all know, our "Team" returned to North Attleborough at the end of June and soon after we began using the air conditioned Saint Mark Church for all of our Masses, devotions, and Adoration. I thank you for your gracious understanding, patience and cooperation in that move.

These summer weeks have not given me a chance to experience the numbers and the needs for each Mass in each of our church buildings. In addition, we know that many people go away for the summer and may not have been worshipping with us. As we approach the start of a new school year, we are already seeing our numbers swell (which is a very good thing!) Before we make any future decisions, I would like to get a handle on the present situation, framing it with some of these questions: Is the present schedule (four Mass times) adequate for the current number of active parishioners? Do we need to change Mass times to accommodate the majority of parishioners? Are we adequately using our three buildings (safety, accessibility, capacity, heating)? These are just some of the questions, not all. As pastor, I have the job of seeing the big picture and planning accordingly. Right now, I need some time and some facts and figures to see and understand that picture.

Once we have gone through the Fall cycle of Masses, we will revisit the Mass schedule question and TOGETHER we will make any necessary changes. In the meantime, I ask for your patience and truly appreciate your openness and trust.

Memorial Prayer Service for Aborted Children



It's a wonderful life

Our days are engulfed in chaos, conflict, and dispiriting news. Then along comes a director like Frank Capra (1897-1991), churning out what have been called "fantasies of good will," imposing order with his ragged little messiahs who take meaningful stands against king-sized injustices. A self-described "Christmas Catholic," Capra fought his moral battles on the silver screen. He believed each person is "essentially good, a living atom of divinity.... Films must be made to say these things, to counteract the violence and the meanness, to buy time to demobilize the hatreds." Take your stand. Tell a story of hope.

Come aside and rest awhile

In a Prayer for Labor Day, the U.S. bishops invite us to ask God: "Make a place in our hearts for compassion to the men and women who labor tirelessly for basic necessities." Labor has always held a place of dignity within our faith. Scripture tells us that the laborer is worthy of his hire (1 Tim. 5:18), and many a church document, including *Rerum Novarum*, outline the value of workers and their work: "Justice, therefore, demands that the interests of the working classes should be carefully watched over, so that they who contribute so largely to the advantage of the community may themselves share in the benefits which they create." And, today, in honor of our labor, it's time to take a break.

The first daughter of charity

It's not every day that a Catholic saint is honored with a United Nations resolution. But then, Mother Teresa is hardly an everyday saint. The U.N. honored the famous nun from Kolkata, known the world over for her hands-on care of the poor, with a resolution in 2013. It declared that on the September 5th anniversary of Mother Teresa's death each year, the world would now observe an International Day of Charity. Let's take her at her word: "Love is not patronizing and charity isn't about pity, it is about love. Charity and love are the same—with charity you give love, so don't just give money but reach out your hand instead."

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6, 9-11; Luke 4:31-37 (432). "All of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness."

Wednesday, Sep 06, 2023

Pray for the persecuted and forgotten

On this day, many Christians of the Eastern tradition celebrate the feast of Saint Donatian and his companions, a group of lesserknown fifth-century martyrs driven out of North Africa by the Arian King Huneric, who persecuted a great many Trinitarians for their faith. Though we may not today face death for our confession, many of our brothers and sisters around the world do, and it is for them that we must pray with the help of Donatian and all who died for the name of Christ. Even more, we are tasked to help them materially if we can, since—as the Lord says—whatsoever we do for the least of his siblings, we do for him.

TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:1-8; Luke 4:38-44 (433). "We have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love that you have for all the holy ones because of the hope reserved for you in heaven."

Thursday, Sep 07, 2023

School days, Golden Rule days

It's back-to-school season. Learning is foundational to our democracy and also to informed faith. In 2,000 years' time, Christianity has overcome countless heresies (a type of twisting of the belief) and accumulated many saints, martyrs, stories, and traditions. With school back in session, consider sending yourself to "school" to learn more about your own religion. Check out study materials from the U.S. Catholic bishops and formed.org, a program both individuals and parishes can use for faith formation. Make a choice to grow in wisdom and understanding.

TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:9-14; Luke 5:1-11 (434). "Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch."

Friday, Sep 08, 2023

A nativity set for the ages

The church officially celebrates three Nativities: the Nativity of Jesus, the Son of God (Christmas); the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist (24 June); and the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (8 September). These events tell us everything we need to know about God, faith, and the path to salvation. Through Jesus' Incarnation, we learn that God is with us—always and everywhere. Through John's witness we come to understand that we are not God—not even close—and we must prepare ourselves to welcome God's great goodness into our lives. And through Mary, we are shown the meaning of true discipleship—how to answer God's call and follow Christ through the joyful, sorrowful, and luminous mysteries of our lives in faith. Celebrate this dynamic trio by living in their light.

Give us this day some peace

"Racism has been part of the social fabric of America since its European colonization. Whether it be the tragic past of Native Americans, Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, or Blacks, the story is one of slavery, peonage, economic exploitation, brutal repression, and cultural neglect." This observation from the 1979 bishops' pastoral *Brothers and Sisters to Us* is why the church in the United States has established today as a "Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities" to promote healing of the racial divides of our nation. Make an honest examination of conscience regarding your thoughts, words, and deeds toward people of other ethnic and racial backgrounds.

MEMORIAL OF PETER CLAVER, PRIEST TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:21-23; Luke 6:1-5 (436). "You once were alienated and hostile in mind because of evil deeds."


You duped me, O LORD, and I let myself be duped; you were too strong for me, and you triumphed. All the day I am an object of laughter; everyone mocks me.



TWENTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Worldliness:

One of my jogging routes takes me past a major intersection. One night as I ran, I saw a northbound motorcycle driver approach the intersection. His passenger's long hair flowed carelessly back in the wind. The light changed to yellow. An eastbound car approached the intersection. Neither one took the caution light seriously. Less than a block earlier, the young motorcycle driver and his fiancée had a future filled with wedding plans, jobs, the hope of a family and home. In an instant, their world was gone. The critically injured young woman mourned the death of her husband-to-be. We have all experienced events in our lives that indicate how fleeting this life is. In an instant everything changes. For this reason, we need to put our trust and faith in the next world, where things will be as they have been promised.

Comment:

Jeremiah was more than a little annoyed with God. Jeremiah hated having to tell God's message. He was persecuted and tortured because of it. But, for Jeremiah, torture was better than disobeying God. Paul continued the same plea of Jeremiah in his letter to the Romans. The Romans, too, formed values of worldly and temporal nature. In his writings, Paul urged the Romans to change their values—to make them more in harmony with the directions of God. He asked the people to live in a way contrary to what society dictated—to be hospitable to strangers, to associate with the lowly, to feed their hungry enemies.

Matthew wrote to the Jewish community of his time telling them to take up the cross and follow Jesus. This meant to let go of the ways and values of the world. To follow Jesus, we must give up our lives for Jesus. We will gain the whole world, a world we cannot fully comprehend, if we give up our lives for Jesus.

Reflection:

Have you ever thought about how difficult it would be to be a prophet? George Burns as God in the movie Oh, God! was enough for me to know the world is a tough audience! The character played by John Denver was a laughingstock and so was Jeremiah. Both were chosen to convey the message to the world that just because "everyone was doing 'it," didn't make "it" right.

Most likely, each of us at some point in our lives has taken a stand that goes against popular opinion. But the cause was something worth risking peer disapproval. Some parents may hold firm to which movies their children can see despite the fact that other parents have relaxed their restrictions. We may march in a pro-life parade even though some people will shout and gesture their criticism. Many advertisers promote self-indulgence telling us we deserve to pamper ourselves and lavish ourselves with luxury. It takes unselfishness to resist those lures and care for someone else before we take care of ourselves.

To carry a cross and deny ourselves the pleasures the world has to offer, often brings about sad emotions and long faces. It sounds hard and harsh, depressing and negative. Perhaps the challenge of "carrying our cross" is more in how we view the obligation rather than the task itself.

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
